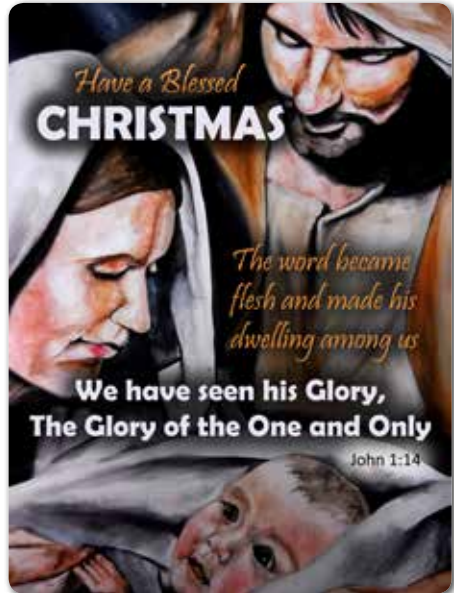

Art

The Big Doodle 2015 St Joseph's Catholic Academy, Hebburn

Eight Year 8 pupils from our school had the opportunity to take part in a series of Drawing workshops based around the theme of 'Line'. Each workshop was themed around different artists and allowed students to explore a range of different drawing techniques. They worked on both small and large scale drawings to help celebrate the Big Draw 2015.

Each teacher running a work shop had chosen an artist to focus their session on, and a specific art technique to introduce pupils to. Each student was given an A3 sheet with a template of a cube upon it. They moved around the workshops and created a doodle from each of the workshops on each face of their cube. At the end of the day the students made their cube/drawing and had the opportunity to put the cubes together to make a 3D drawing throughout the space. The work was exceptionally impressive with two of our students picking up awards for their artwork. A great day was had by all and the work and attitude of our girls was exemplary.



Business & Economics

BTEC Business Placements

The Year 12 BTEC Business Level 2 students have started their placements and are enjoying the challenges working life can bring – early starts, late finishes, hard work and learning lots of new skills.

This year there are 12 girls on the BTEC Level 2 Business course and each of them have chosen placements they are interested in pursuing when they are older. Primary schools are still the favourite placement for many of the girls – going back to their primary school and seeing what daily life is like from a teaching and supervisory perspective. Georgia Tansey is at St Cuthbert's Primary school where she is helping out with Year 1 pupils "it's really hard work but I really like it, the pupils are really keen to learn and take advantage of all the help I can give them"

Brogan Black is at Southwick Primary school, she says "I love working with kids – no two days are ever the same! I really like the challenges working in a school gives you and this is something I would like to do when I am older"

The other students are at placements as wide ranging as Solicitors offices, hairdressers and Boots the chemist. Although its early days all the girls are enjoying themselves.

Lorna McDonald is at Hedley's Solicitors "I am really enjoying being part of the administration team at Hedley's everyone is really friendly and they have all helped me to settle in. I am looking forward to spending the rest of the year here as I think it's a fantastic opportunity to get some work experience.

Emily Welsh is at Boots the Chemist in the Bridges "I really like working in Boots and the staff are so nice. I am learning how to work as part of a team and am learning some good communication and teamwork skills"

As part of the BTEC programme students are learning about a wide variety of business topics, all of which will help them improve their business knowledge and skills which will help them in future working life. We are planning a visit to the Apple Store in Newcastle to learn about having an online business so come back and see how we get on in our next issue.

Year 7 Enterprise

Year 7s are being set the challenge of setting up and running their own business that will focus on ethics and recycling. They will have weekly meetings, where they will work in small teams to create a product using recycled material, assessing the beneficial impacts that this will have on the environment. They will carry out research on their potential customers and devise a successful marketing campaign and pricing strategy. Prizes will be issued to the groups who demonstrate the best; group work, design ideas and presentation skills at the end of the competition time.

Year 12 – Hexham and Newcastle Catholic Partnership Enterprise Competition

Two teams of St. Anthony's students travelled to St. Joseph's in Hebburn to compete against 7 other groups in a competition that allowed them to take on the role of business advisor to recommend future actions of a business outlined in a specified case study. They had to recommend a course of action for a Smoothie company, deciding on a possible: location, marketing campaign, product description and features, pricing strategy and to advise the business with its financial issues. The material that the students were provided with was based on that given to candidates going through the Accountancy qualifications, allowing the students to demonstrate and develop their problem solving, communication, team working, creativity and

presentation skills. Both teams performed very well with Courtney Collins, Louise Parker, Elle Horwood and Sophie Jackson taking second place in the competition and Eleanor Ash, Jennifer Connolly, Sophia Robinson and Lydia Ellison coming third in the competition.



Business & Economics



Year 13 – Sunderland University

Year 13 business studies students were given the opportunity to have a personalised finance lessons with one of the lecturers from Sunderland University, Kudz Munongi. Students were involved in a mini-break-even lecture based at St. Anthony's, where students had to decide at which level of output the business needed to produce at in order to make a profit. Kudz developed the lecture to talk about the exciting opportunities that are available at Sunderland University, including the wide range of business/ business related courses. He concluded the presentation with a very motivations description of how he got to where he is today, outlining that determination and perseverance is the key to a successful career. Ultimately this gave the students a good overall feel of what university life is all about at a time when they are completing their UCAS forms.

Some students who completed a work experience in schools or nurseries have been able to relate their roles into their assignments, helping them to reach higher grades.

They have researched and presented their findings well and continue to revise developmental milestones in readiness for their exam in January; we wish them luck!

Meanwhile the Year 10 girls have been learning about toys ie what makes a good toy, and how to provide safe and stimulating toys for a variety of



ages. The girls have shown their ideas to each other and have discussed how toys can promote holistic development.

Year 12 are settling nicely into both their Daycare and Primary School Placements. They have been putting the theory of Health and Safety learned in Unit 4 into practice in the workplace setting, already taking part in fire drills and trips/visits.

Design Club Does VENTURA

Now in its sixth year, Design Ventura is a free national competition for students in Years 9, 10 and 11. It places design skills in a real world context, developing creativity, problem-solving, teamwork and enterprise capabilities. Design Ventura offers participants opportunities to visit the Design Museum and to encounter experts from Design and Business, online or in person. Competition prizes include the chance to see your work exhibited at the museum, support from experts to develop your idea, and one winning idea will be developed and sold in the Design Museum Shop.

Year 9 girls who attend Design Club on Thursday lunchtimes have been working very hard on their ideas for the past six weeks, but only one group's idea could be selected for submission to the judging panel in London. The winning team designed an interchangeable bag for people 'on the go', which can be written and drawn on, using fibre tip fabric pens, and can be detached from the ergonomic handles for machine washing. The product is environmentally friendly by promoting the reuse of the bag in place of plastic; it is made from recycled plastic and organic textiles.

In the summer of 2015 Mrs Sherriff was awarded the role of "School Food Champion". Schools across England were selected because they met the DfE criteria for low school uptake, but more importantly, because they have enthusiastic food teachers who are passionate about teaching cooking and nutrition to their pupils. As part of this program, Mrs Sherriff and Mrs Hearn have been working alongside the Catering Team to develop new and exciting menus that meet the criteria of the School Food Plan <http://www.schoolfoodplan.com/plan/>.

The School Food Plan was launched by the DfE in September 2014, and includes a new set of standards for all food served in schools. The new standards are designed to make it easier for school cooks to create imaginative, flexible and nutritious menus. At St Anthony's we have seen a whopping 20% increase in the uptake of school meals since September 2015.

The menus and allergen information are now available for parents and students to view on the Academy website. Please arrange to see us if you have a specific dietary need. Our School Nutrition Action Group (SNAG) will be reestablished soon and we are looking for student and staff volunteers to help us make Martha's Kitchen a fantastic dining experience! If you care about school food, then please join us and have your say about what improvements and changes we can make.

Drama Studies: The Tragedy Of It!



The Classics and Drama students in the Sixth Form explored Greek Drama with Ross Wilkinson from Durham University. They delved into two ancient Greek plays, *Medea* and *Women at the Thesmophoria*, analysing how they portray the roles of women in Ancient Greek society. The students created their own dramatic response to the plays, acting out scenes with their own take. They were also very lucky to handle some ancient Greek and Roman artefacts, specially brought in from Durham University's archives. These included some unusual artefacts like a Roman roof tile with a paw print embedded into it and a pumice stone from the volcanic eruption in Pompeii.



Extended Curricular



Well done to the girls from Years 9 - 13 who helped give out the goodie bags to over 55,000 runners at this year's Great North Run. The girls worked extremely hard throughout the day to get ready for the runners coming over the finish line, and making sure everyone received their bags.

Geography

Year 12 River Residential

Year 12 visited Egton, in the North York Moors, to carry out river-based fieldwork. After arriving at the river, the students used a range of measuring equipment to investigate how the river changes as it flows downstream. They measured features of the river at three separate locations, such as its width, velocity and gradient, looking at the different landforms at each place. They then went back to the accommodation and worked hard to analyse their results, drawing graphs and cross sections, and also trying some statistical techniques! The following morning they visited the village of Lealholm to practise their field sketches, but not before having a lovely English breakfast cooked by Mr. Hermon!



GCSE Whitby Visit

In September, Year 11 students visited Whitby to collect information for their GCSE controlled assessment.

The girls explored the town whilst taking note of the land use and environmental quality of the area.

They were also brave enough to ask questions of tourists and local people to discover their opinions about the impact of tourism. In the afternoon, the girls enjoyed a bit of free time to explore the unique shops and to sample Whitby's famous fish and chips! They enjoyed their day and were a credit to the school.



History & Politics



Beamish Adventures with Year 8

In the summer term rallying shouts could be heard from Year 8s in Beamish of “What do we want? Votes for women! When do we want them? Now!” It was the History department’s annual trip to Beamish to remember the women’s suffrage movement and make our own mark on History. The pupils dressed in Victorian clothing and marched through the Victorian streets of Beamish holding a rally for women’s rights. They then congregated in the Free Mason’s Hall for a debate about women’s suffrage, with many eloquent and enthusiastic arguments pouring forth.

The History Club were very privileged to see an exhibition about the Magna Carta held by the Durham University’s Library, including an original early edition of the Magna Carta. The pupils also participated in a session exploring what the Magna Carta means to us today and what it means to be a citizen. 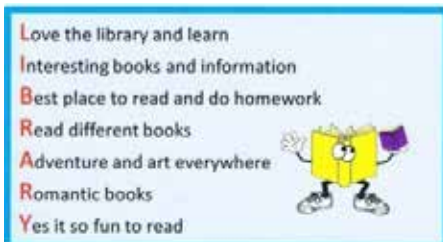


Valerie Laws

Maths

A-Level Results 2015

Last summer the A-Level Results saw some outstanding performances in Mathematics.

At A2 Level 37% of passes were at A* or A grade with 74% at the top grades of A*-B and with an overall pass rate of 100%.

At AS Level 16% of passes were at A grade with 35% at the top grades of A-B and with an overall pass rate of 76%.

At AS Level Further Maths 10% of passes were at A grade with 40% at the top grades of A-B and with an overall pass rate of 90%.

Students can login using any PC or laptop and the free Puffin Academy app allows them to access MyMaths on mobile and tablet devices.

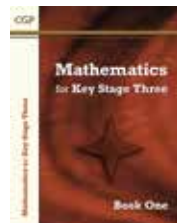

This enables pupils to complete homework and personal study without the need to take home a textbook. The online version can be accessed from any computer once an account has been registered.

Dr Emery and Mrs Laydon along with Karen, a representative from Sunderland University, Chris an MYC trustee, and two newcomers – Grace and Janet – spent 12 days in Manzini in July of this year.

We had a fantastic time and we thank you for your continued support and encouragement – it really does change things for the children on Manzini.

Once again we worked closely with Enjabulweni School, a school that provides a free primary education to the most deprived children in Manzini, including those in the Manzini Youth Care homes. We were asked to help particularly with the Grade

7 classes (the equivalent to our Year 6 pupils) who are struggling with their English studies. To this end we helped with evening tutoring sessions and visited a number of other schools in the area to collect examples of good practice and managed to acquire some excellent resources which could be shared by the staff and pupils at the school.

We were shocked to discover that the government no longer provides the school with textbooks; it is classed as a private school as it is an NGO (Non Government Organisation) school and not government registered. We have returned home determined to campaign on this issue on behalf of MYC.

We visited Hope House, a hospice for the terminally ill and we continue to be moved by the efforts of Sr. Elsa and her staff to care for the children and adults suffering from AIDS and TB. We met a young child with epilepsy who had fallen into a fire and needed an operation to help him walk. A colleague from Sunderland University funded some specialist equipment to help him and we left a small donation with Sr. Elsa, on your behalf.

We were honoured to visit a pre-school run by **The Missionary Sisters of Mary, Help of Christians (MSMHC)**. We were delighted when the children sang to us!

Another moving assembly came on the last day when the Enjabulweni children sang and danced in their usual wonderful manner.

We have also agreed to link with St Anne's Catholic Girls' School, a Salesian High School in the Malkerns, in Swaziland. We look forward to this new venture.

The Chief Inspectors for Pre-School Education in Swaziland asked to meet with us. They have asked us to share with them our experience of good inspection practice. Mrs Miller will have her work cut out for her when she visits in July 2016! We will also use the links we have with Sunderland University to facilitate this.

We have used a small amount of your fundraising and money raised by Sunderland University to employ a tutor to work with the boys two evenings per week to help prepare for their English exams.

Tony Nzima is an ex MYC young man and he has an excellent command of English – we hope you agree this is money well spent. We are in the process of sending more funds out to provide a printer and scanner for Tony as buying past exam papers for his pupils to practise on, is proving very expensive. In the long term it will be cheaper for Tony to scan and print his own materials. He has asked us to say a big thank you to everyone for the opportunity given to him to support the boys, and also for the resources made available to him through your continued fundraising – THANK YOU!

We also distributed clothes and toiletries to all the children in the MYC homes.

The new girls' home still needs a bit of work doing to it, but with the support from St Anthony's, Sunderland University and other sponsors, it will continue to be a safe haven for many girls in years to come. Bonsile (bottom right) is an ex MYC girl. At the moment she is studying for her nursing degree helped by three personal sponsors from the UK. Many of the girls in the new home are

Congratulations to all pupils who have achieved 100% attendance this term. There are 66 pupils in the Year group who have achieved 100% attendance.

Attendance in Year 11 is so important if you are to achieve your potential in your GCSE exams.

- a child who is absent a day of school per week misses an equivalent of two years of their school life
- 90% of young people with absence rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE and around one third achieve no GCSEs at all
- poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable



Year 11 have had their mock examinations this December to prepare them for their final exams in the Summer. This is a challenging year for any student sitting exams. Please speak to your form tutor, Mrs Charlton or Miss Brown if you have any concerns about your exam performance.

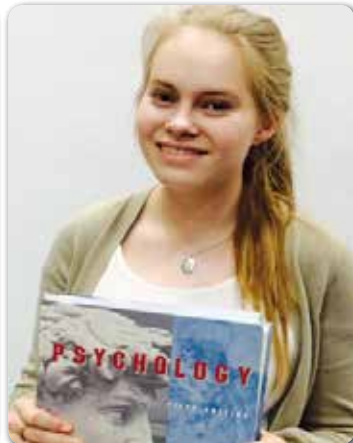

Living Streets

In the Summer term the Living Streets members, who were in Year 7, organised workshops for the Year 6 pupils on the Transition days. They ran seven sessions where they delivered a presentation they had produced, and they worked with groups completing worksheets. Alison Fisher from Living Streets (the charity supporting the rights of pedestrians), who has worked with us on a number of projects, was also involved. We looked at a map of where all the Year 6 girls lived and discussed how they could have walking buddies for their journey to school. This has been commended to other schools as an example of good practice. They were given a special map of the streets around school to show their travelling options, using public transport and walking part of the way. A ten-minute walking circle was also on the map so that parents could drop girls away from the Academy and cut down on congestion in Thornhill Terrace.



During the Autumn term we have had three campaigns. Our first was Free Your Feet – this involved Year 7 and Year 8. The Living Streets group, who are now Year 8, delivered assemblies to these two Year groups to launch the event. There has been a competition where girls who had walked further to the Academy were put in a draw to win High Street shopping vouchers. The second campaign has been a Travel Survey for Go Smarter, where staff and pupils have given details of how they have travelled, and how they would like to travel here.

Our latest campaign has been around energy use in school – Switch Off Fortnight. 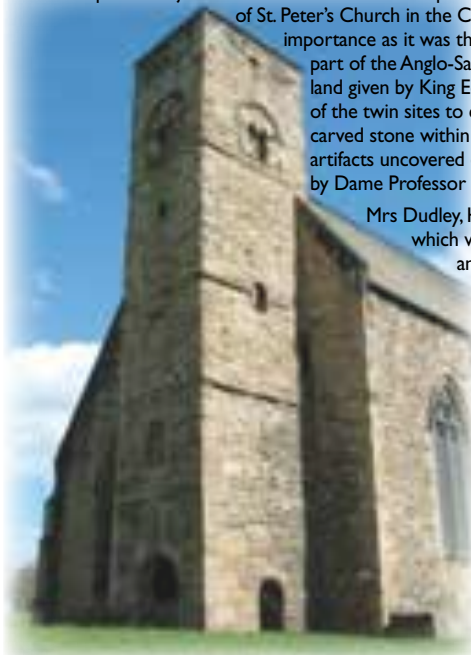

The Launch of St. Peter's

The RE Department joined forces with the Music Department to take part in the launch of the re-development of St. Peter's Church in the City Centre. St. Peter's is rich with historical and religious importance as it was the home of the Venerable Bede in the 7th century AD, part of the Anglo-Saxon Wearmouth-Jarrow monastery. St. Peter's, built on land given by King Ecgrith to St. Benedict Biscop in 673 AD, is the earlier of the twin sites to come to life, and in the church can be seen the original carved stone within a reconstruction of the abbot's seat, among many artifacts uncovered during the 1960's archaeological excavation conducted by Dame Professor Rosemary Cramp of Durham University.

Mrs Dudley, Head of Music, composed her own hymn to St. Bede which was sung by our fantastic Choir, who lined the pathway and serenaded the Bishop and guests as they made their way to the Church for the opening ceremony. The Codex Bible which had been created by our Year 8 RE students was presented to the Bishop and is now displayed in St. Peter's for all to see.

Brand New General RE Course

In 2015 the Religious Education Department in St Anthony's Catholic Academy is launching our new General RE Programme.

Pupils will be offered a number of unique volunteering opportunities around the local area. Additionally, the new curriculum invites all students to directly engage with

issues permeating our everyday lives. Pupils who do not select a volunteer placement will attend one lesson a week of General RE. In this time pupils will study current issues in society and learn how as a Catholic school we can help fight against injustice and poverty. Each pupil will complete a reflection diary each week upon their lesson of study. RE Students Re-Create History

RE students in Years 7 and 8 have been busy getting creative and reflective in preparing a 'Codex' Bible in honour of the first ever 'Codex Amiatinus' written by St. Bede. Of the three Saxon Bibles produced at the twin monastery of Wearmouth-Jarrow in the 8th century, the original Codex Amiatinus, now in the Laurentian Library in Florence, is the only one that survives intact today. It is the oldest one-volume Latin Bible to survive in the world, and is important to Biblical scholars as well as being an artistic treasure. The original manuscript has been unbound by experts in Florence in order to produce a limited number of smaller facsimiles, one of which can now be seen on display in Sunderland City Library.

Ian Parkin, Senior Project Manager for Sunderland City Council asked St. Anthony's students to contribute to this Codex in preparation for the launch of the re-development of St. Peter's Church in the City Centre. St. Peter's was home of the Venerable Bede in the 7th century AD, part of the Anglo-Saxon Wearmouth-Jarrow monastery. Students were asked the question "What does your faith mean to you?" and they produced creative reflections on this using inspirational quotations, personal experiences and artistic flare. All pieces of work have been bound together to create the Codex and presented to the Bishop at the St. Peter's launch.

Sowing the seed: Taking Theology Further

A delight for any department is to see the number of students going onto university to take their subject at degree level. The RE department have the double delight of students not only going onto Theology degree courses but also expressing interest in going onto teach RE as a career afterwards. There is a current shortage of Catholic RE teachers across the country. Many dioceses including our own are looking again at how they address RE teacher recruitment.

At St. Anthony's we are already leading the way by establishing links with various University Theology departments and taking our Sixth Form students to visit. Other interested potential candidates have assisted RE teaching staff by helping to support some younger students in lessons. Our Theology students are due to attend Leeds Trinity University as part of the newly established link with our department. The RE department is committed to helping our students to take their learning of Theology further in the hope that some of them return to teach RE in the near future. *2 Corinthians 9:6 The point is this: whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows bountifully will also reap bountifully.*
