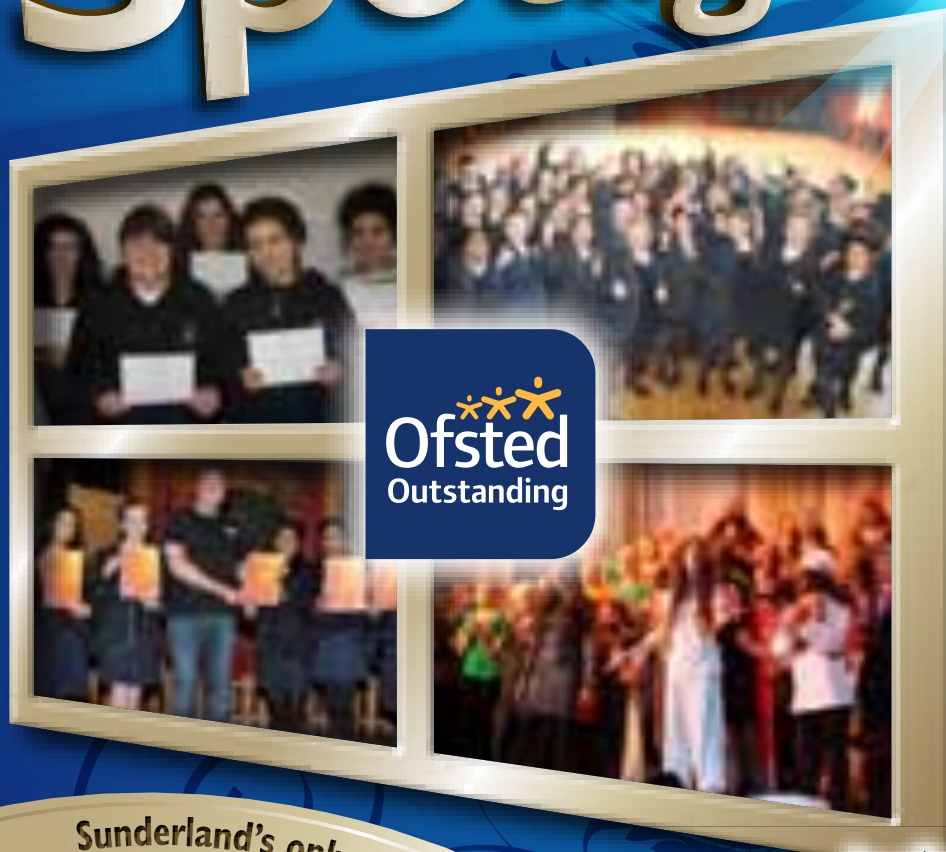

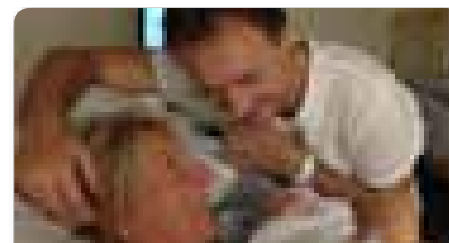

## Louise Pitt (St. Anthony's 1985 to 1992)

Louise Pitt is one of the great success stories of St. Anthony's past pupils, having established herself very successfully in a career in banking. Her name will resonate with all Sunderland fans – her father, Ritchie Pitt, was a member of the Sunderland FA Cup-winning team of 1973 when Louise was only 6 weeks old!

Louise was a very successful pupil and did very well in both GCSE and A Levels. She did a gap year working for CS Banking in Guernsey and then went on to Bristol University in 1992 and graduated with a BA Honours degree in Hispanic and Latin American studies. During her time there she spent one year studying the Spanish financial system at the Universidad de Menéndez Pelayo in Santander, Spain.

Louise has had a very successful career in finance since completing her degree and has worked for some of the biggest names in international banking. She first worked in the City of London for JP Morgan as a trader and research analyst and then spent two years working for Credit Suisse First Boston as Vice President to run European Financial Institutions' Credit research. In 2002 she joined the prestigious Goldman Sachs and Co., firstly in their London offices before relocating to New York in 2004.

Goldman Sachs is a leading global investment bank, security and investment management firm that was founded in 1869, and is one of the most successful financial houses in the world with over 10,000 employees. In 2005 Louise became a Managing

Director with the firm and currently holds the post of Managing Director Global Research Division. She is now an experienced and successful financial professional, specialising in contingent capital.

She has a home in Manhattan which she shares with Luke, whom she first met at university, and her two beloved cocker spaniels. She also has a second home in The Hamptons. She is very keen on sports and loves to watch rugby and football from England when she can. Louise is also involved in charitable work. She was Director of the Board University of Bristol Foundation, Inc. in the United States and has sponsored six pupils in attending private high school through the Student Sponsor Partners organization. While at St. Anthony's she was a very keen musician and learned to play the piano, cello and double bass. While her work commitments do not allow her to play any more, she continues to support music development. She is currently Chair of the Board of Music for Autism, (M4A) and has generously underwritten a number of concerts for the organization since joining in 2008.

Louise and Luke were both delighted to welcome baby Joanna Mary in November 2012. She was born 8 weeks prematurely and had to spend time in hospital but is now doing very well. Louise is very happy with the experience of this new chapter in her life after so many years dedicated to her career.

She returns to Sunderland regularly and visited St. Anthony's in March this year when she was thrilled with the many changes and new teaching buildings.

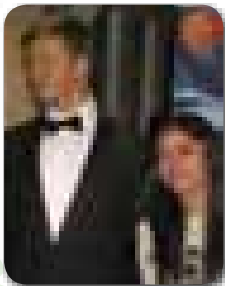


## Art

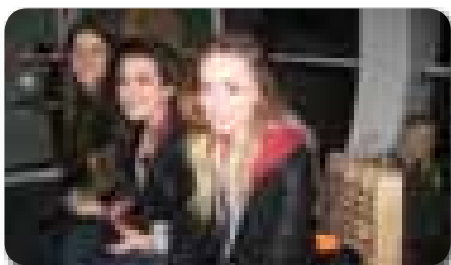
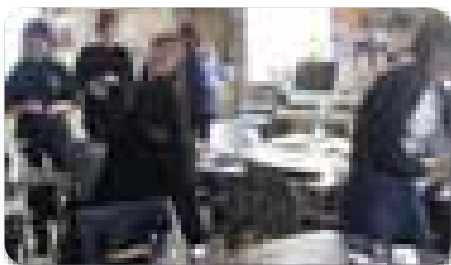
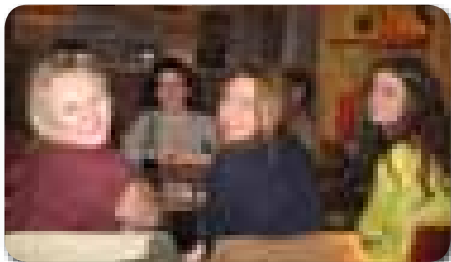


The department has been very busy with exam work, trying to make sure that all coursework is to

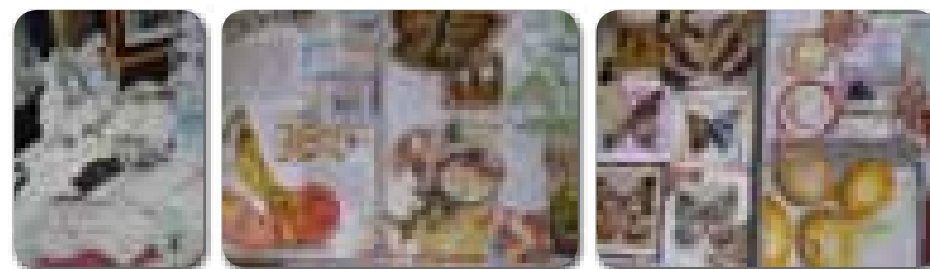
the pupils' highest possible standard. We wish all of our pupils well for the public exams and in particular those in Year 13 who have University and Art College places to be gained by their success.

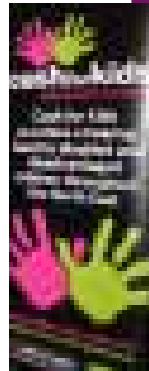
### McDonalds Visit

Pupils were set a task of generating a franchise idea for a business of their choice. The ideas were very innovative and included beauty buses which bring beauty treatment to the home and a range of gyms and fitness sessions aimed specifically at teenagers. All of the groups worked hard to consider a range of elements of the marketing mix to ensure their proposal would be successful. The girls then presented their findings and answered questions relating to the business, and all demonstrated a detailed understanding of what is required to run a successful franchise.

Please God, you will all have a restful and safe holiday this Summer. God bless. Sisters Adrienne and Francis.

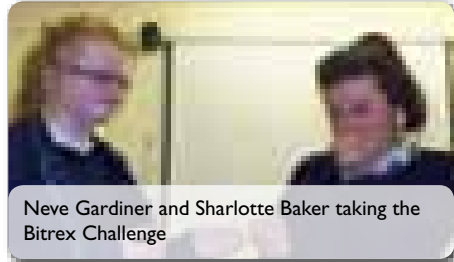

The teams were shown on Tyne Tees and Sky News, and represented the academy, themselves and their sponsors extremely well.

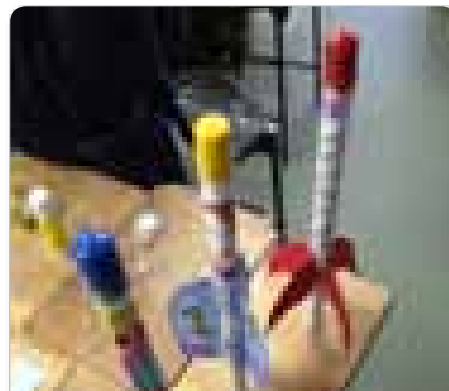
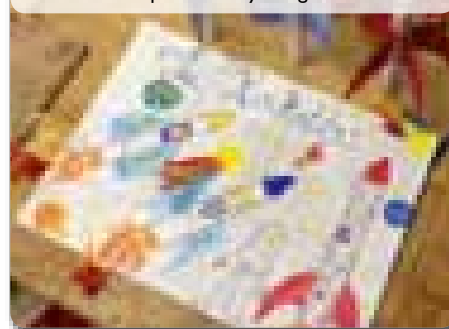

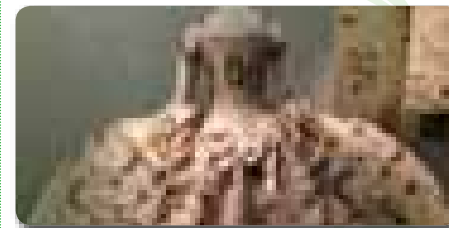

## Textiles and Art Visit to London

On a cold, damp February morning a group of 17 excited Textiles and Art pupils from Years 11, 12 and 13 met with 4 members of St. Anthony's teaching staff on the concourse of Newcastle train station to go on a joint visit to London.

First stop, with the sun shining the Textiles pupils visited the Fashion and Textile Museum. The FTM is a cutting edge centre for contemporary fashion, textiles and jewellery established by Zandra Rhodes. The featured exhibition was "Hartnell to Amies" – Couture by Royal Appointment. It celebrated the timeless elegance of London couture and explored how the Queen's patronage of ground-breaking British designers helped put London on the international fashion map after the Second World War. A quick whistle-stop tour of Covent Garden was followed by dinner then an evening flight on the London Eye. Exhausted, but happy, we retired to our hotel.



The following day we visited the Victoria and Albert Museum. The V&A's Fashion collection is the largest and most comprehensive collection of dress in the world. Key items in the collection include rare 17th-century gowns, 18th-century 'mantua' dresses, 1930s eveningwear, 1960s daywear and post-war couture. Plus, they observed a growing number of pieces from 21st-Century designers.

The highlight of the day for Mrs Sherriff was seeing Adam Ants "Prince Charming" Costume.

Another whistle-stop visit was planned for a quick shop at Harrods before embarking on our train journey home.

The visit was a great success and all pupils and staff had a fantastic and informative two days. The pupils were a credit to St Anthony's and to their parents.

## The CLIP Carnegie Medal

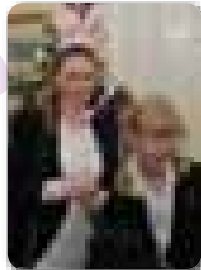

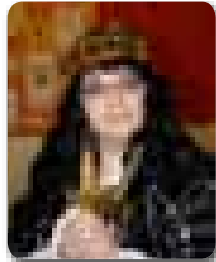


Princess Leia from Star Wars even graced us with her presence, and Little Red Riding Hood called in with a basket of food to keep our hard-working girls going.

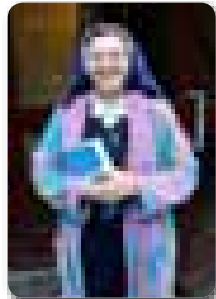
Pupils were amazed to see Lady Macbeth arrive to teach their class – she had clearly washed her hands, as no blood spots were evident – though

## Year 10 and 11 Italy Cultural Visit

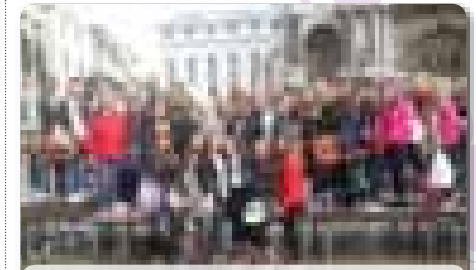

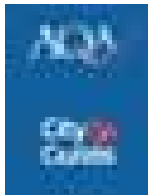

# Extended Project Qualification

## Outstanding Extended Project Qualification Results 2013



This year we have had our **most successful year** for the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) and the **17 pupils** who submitted projects all achieved excellent marks. The EPQ is a skills-based qualification specifically designed to aid transition to higher education by stretching and challenging 'A' level pupils. It offers the opportunity to produce an extended piece of work either in an area that they are already studying, or in which they have a particular interest. In the process it also equips them with the research, reflection and independent study skills they will need to be successful at university. Pupils are required to identify and draft the aims of their project and then plan, research and carry out the work providing evidence of all stages in a portfolio and deliver a presentation summarising their project to an audience.

## Sarah's TRIumphant EPQ Result!

St. Anthony's Academy star Iron Man Tri-athlete **Sarah Norman** became the first pupil to score the top grade of an **A\*** in her Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) this year.

Year 13 pupil Sarah produced a video documentary entitled "Drugs: You use, You Lose?" in which she investigated the abuse of drugs in sport to enhance an athlete's chance of winning. Looking at the science behind the drugs she explored natural legal alternatives, such as Yoga, which could be used to the same effect. Sarah then tried out these methods with her coach Ken Barnes and a group of fellow tri-athletes as part of her training regime for the Iron Man Triathlon which is made up of a 4k swim, 112 mile cycle and 26 mile run.

"My coach and I began working on triathlon training on 22nd July 2012. I researched lots of natural drug alternatives: 'narcotic analgesics vs. sport massage', 'steroid injections vs. raw proteins and eggs' and 'beta blockers vs. ice bath'. I then put them into practice while creating a documentary of my training experiences." says Sarah.

Sarah's project supervisor Mr McDonagh was particularly impressed by her planning and attention to detail, not only in the project but also in the training programme that Sarah designed. The AQA Examiners agreed and the

end result speaks for itself, an **Outstanding** piece of research leading to an interesting documentary. Well done Sarah!



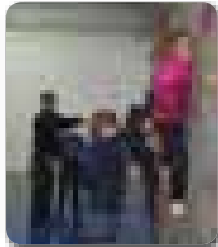
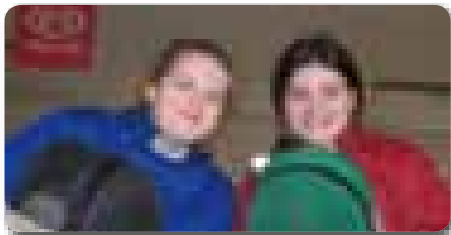
## Extended Curricular

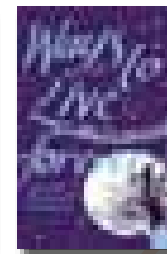
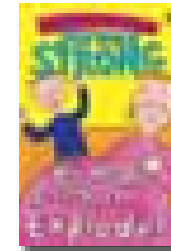
### Reading Club



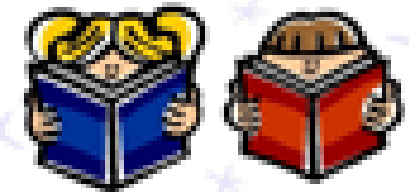

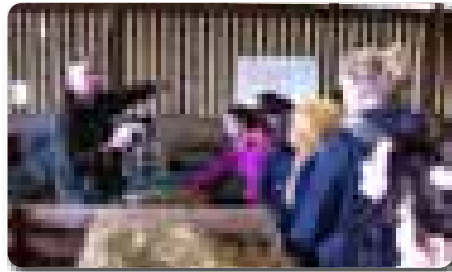
# Geography

## The Academy's International Links

The Academy continues to develop its international links; it maintains and builds on existing links and also develops new relationships with schools and organizations abroad. The items below provide a flavour of developments in this area.

### China

St. Anthony's is aware of the growing importance of links with China and the study of Mandarin.



In July / August 2012 the school sponsored Ms Alice Robinson's visit to Beijing for a 3-week course on Chinese culture and language and she currently runs a Mandarin Club in Year 9.

We are working with St. Aidan's School and Sixth Form College and the Local Authority to provide placements for Chinese pupils. These arrangements are still at the initial stages but represent an opportunity for Chinese girls to work in St. Anthony's. The opportunities for reciprocal visits to China are an exciting development for the future.

We are also working with Sunderland Local Authority and a group of Sunderland schools to host a visit by 6 Chinese teachers later in 2013.

### India - British Council Connecting Classrooms Project

St. Anthony's has received funding from the British Council to continue to work with KVKV school in Rajkot, in the Indian state of Gujarat. Ms. Sonal Shah, Head Teacher, visited St. Anthony's in July. With support from the Sisters of Mercy and money raised by themselves, four Year 12 pupils, Emily Best, Mollie Rennoldson, Caitlin Strong and Rebecca Toomey, will accompany Mr. Flores and Mr. Jordan to India in October 2013 to take part in a programme of activities working with Indian pupils. Grateful thanks to The Mallard in Seaham for organising a fund-raising activity and to the Uniform Shop for donating very smart polo shirts for the staff and pupils to wear.



### Korea

The school is part of a team of schools from the North East of England working with 'Creativity Culture and



Education' in teacher-exchange visits with Korean teachers as part of their Creative Partnerships in Education programme. Their Korean partners for this exchange are the International Teacher Exchange Team at Asia-Pacific Centre of Education for International Understanding, (APCEIU), under the auspices of UNESCO, as part of their Teaching Abroad for Global Competency.

We are linked directly to Guwol Girls' Middle School in Incheon and are also working with teachers from JungAng Girls' High School (Busan) and Korea Biological Science High School in Gyeongbuk. Miss Katie Brown is St. Anthony's Lead Teacher for this programme; she is visiting Korea for 3 weeks in June / July 2013.

### Spain - Instituto Alonso de Covarrubias, Torrijos



The Academy has an excellent link with this Spanish secondary school. Five members of staff have visited St. Anthony's in the last 3 years. They spent time observing lessons, following a programme of seminars with senior staff and improving their English. There was also a very successful pupil exchange visit in February 2011.

In the spring term we prepared a joint bid for Comenius Funding from the European Union to enable the schools to do pupil exchanges for the next two years. We will find out in August 2013 if the bid has been successful, we hope so that we can continue this very important exchange.

### Sweden - University of Linnaeus



The partnership of our Academy and this prestigious Swedish university has been established for nearly a decade. We regularly welcome initial trainee teachers for visits of up to two weeks. In February 2013 we hosted a visit by 10 trainee teachers and 2 members of staff. They toured the school, attended lectures on the English education system and observed the teaching and learning of pupils and staff in a variety of lessons.

Two members of staff have been formally invited to visit Sweden and contribute to the taught programme of English trainees. They will also visit schools and meet colleagues from a range of educational backgrounds.

## Humanities visit to York Castle Museum

In April the girls studying Humanities enjoyed a great day out at the York Castle Museum, in preparation for their controlled assessment topic. Girls spent the day investigating different aspects of childhood throughout the last 100 years, including christening traditions, changes in care for pregnant women, and the children's toys. Girls also received an illuminating talk from museum staff on the tradition of blood letting, and the role of the Barber in this gruesome task!

## Leeds Medical Museum

In April all Year 10 pupils studying History travelled to Leeds Thackray Medical Museum. The girls spent the day developing their knowledge of the development of medicine and public health from experiencing the smell of a nineteenth century town to viewing a gruesome amputation, this visit help to bring alive the pupils current topic. The girls enjoyed looking at the various displays and interacting with the exhibits.

## Segedunum Roman Fort

In preparation for their controlled assessment Year 10 pupils visited Segedunum Roman Fort. They toured the site and participated in a talk from the observation tower through which they envisioned what Segedunum would have looked like at the height of the Romans

power in 200 AD. Pupils gained relevant knowledge relating to the location and layout of the fort to help them complete their controlled assessment.

## Alnwick Castle Visit

This year a Harry Potter Club was started at St. Anthony's to highlight the links between History and Religious Education for pupils in Year 8 by new staff Miss Moran and Miss Pascoe. As part of this club, the girls went on a visit to Alnwick Castle where many of the scenes from Harry Potter and the Philosophers Stone were filmed. They had a tour of the castle and dungeons and even took part in broomstick training with two resident wizards! The girls had a great time and enjoyed walking in the footsteps of Harry, Ron and Hermione!

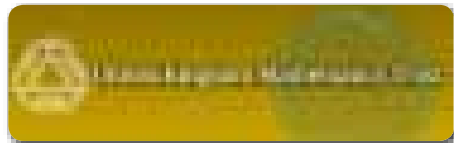
## Berlin Visit

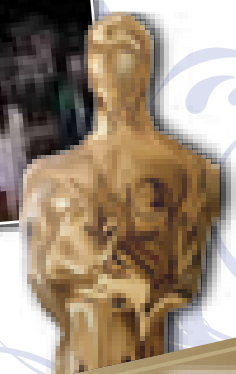
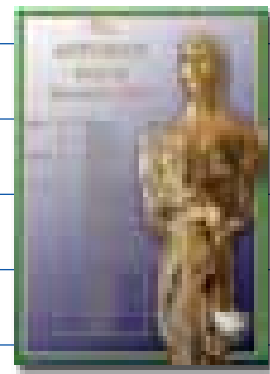
# The Antonian Awards 2013

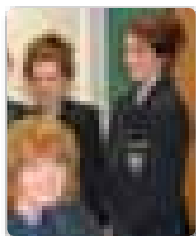


## Reading Club

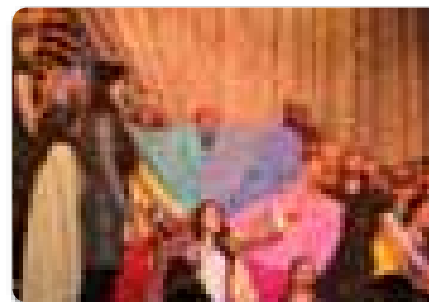

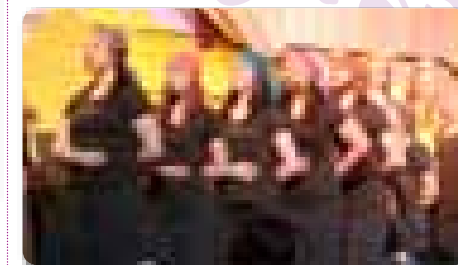
## Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Experience! from a pupil perspective

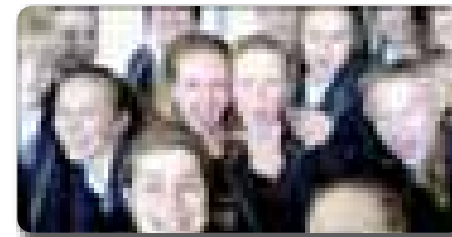

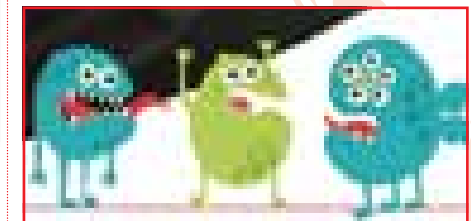

### Year 8 pupils enter Microbiology Competition



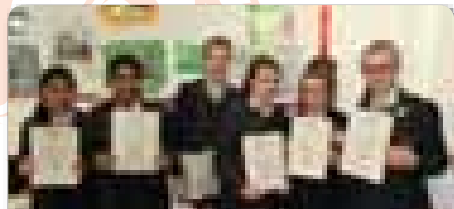
The Microbiology in Schools Advisory Committee introduced a competition to enhance pupil interest in microbiology in 1985. It became an annual event in 1994 and the MiSAC Annual Competition for Key Stages 3 and 4 now attracts up to 2,000 pupil entries each year. Each year's topic is linked to the National Curriculum and special sponsorship provides money prizes totalling £1,000 for students and their schools.

### Facebug: A Social Media Network for Microbes

This year's competition was to create a social network page for one species of microbe in order to improve the understanding of how microbes interact with each other and contribute to human health and disease. Entries had to be on an A3 piece of paper and had to give details of the chosen microbe's life, job, relationships, friends and travels using biological information.

Entries could be as individuals or in teams of up to four pupils, and three Year 8 entries were sent in from St Anthony's in March which were produced by six girls. 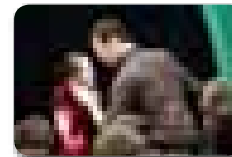
#### Bake-off!

### Fundraising

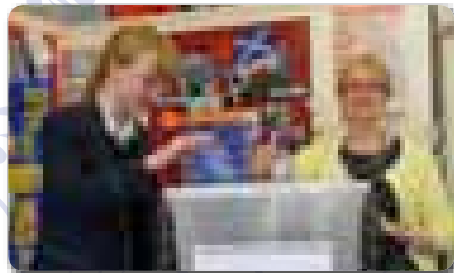

### Assemblies



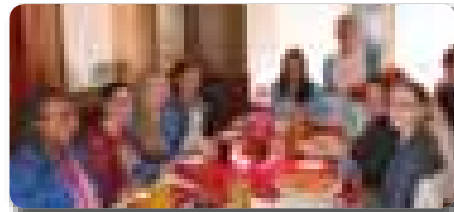

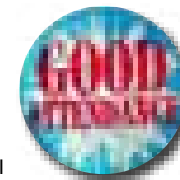


### Celebrating the Feast of St Anthony

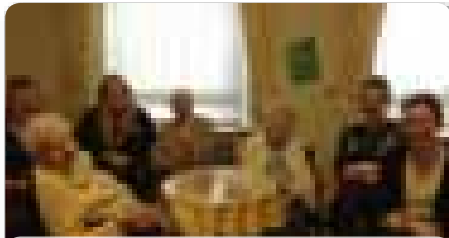

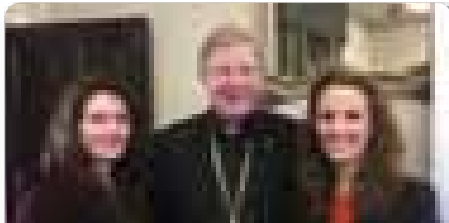

#### Good news

#### Living Streets

The group are once again involved in planning the transition visits for Year 6 pupils. They will give presentations to our new starters and distribute the Walking Guide to St. Anthony's which they produced last year. They have successfully worked on the issue of travel to school again this year and worked on questionnaires to all Year groups to raise awareness and perhaps change attitudes. They gave out rewards at the school gate for pupils walking and distributed postcards in assemblies.

#### Chernobyl Children's Charity

There were special assemblies to mark the Anniversary of the Chernobyl nuclear power station disaster. Girls from the Sixth Form, Year 11 and Year 8 were very generous. #### Biology Challenge 2013



The Biology Challenge is open to all Year 9 and 10 pupils in Great Britain and is an online competition which consists of two 30-minute papers taken in March. Gold, Silver and Bronze awards are available and there is also the opportunity for top scoring pupils to be presented with prizes at an awards ceremony at the Royal Society in London. The competition aims to encourage an interest in Biology beyond the school curriculum by stimulating curiosity in the natural world and acts as a junior version of the British Biology Olympiad.

Questions are set on the topics covered in Biology, but the Biology Challenge also rewards pupils whose knowledge of the subject has been increased by reading books and magazines, watching natural history programmes and taking



notice of the news media for items of biological interest; pupils who are generally aware of our natural flora and fauna. This year St. Anthony's was one of 538 schools that registered for the Biology Challenge joining almost 31,000 pupils who took part nationally.

Eight Year 9 pupils and forty-six Year 10 pupils from St. Anthony's took part for the first time this year and demonstrated their wide knowledge of Biology. All pupils did very well but a special mention must be given to **Jennifer Welsh** in Year 9 who achieved a **Gold award**. Four Year 10 pupils also did brilliantly and achieved Bronze awards; Kate Thynne, Bethany Richardson, Gabrielle Kay and Emily Fox.

In addition, 16 students just missed out on Bronze gaining Highly Commended marks; Eloise Applegarth, Emily Chisholm, Ella Farrell, Emma Ford, Savannah Lawrence, Kate MacKinnon, Georgia McCluskey, Megan Quinn, Eve Watson, Chloe Fairweather, Anna Foster, Jessica Phipps, Claudia Spoor, Emily Woodley, Ann Andreas, and Jessica Aldiss. A further 16 students achieved Commended marks; Livia Scott, Anya Mason, Lauren Broom, Rachel Lim, Lucy Tilbury, Olivia Chisholm, Rebecca Dixon, Faye Huntley, Sophie Jackson, Hannah Laverick, Leilla Stewart, Kate Summerson, Carmel Moran, Annabel Barnes, Ellie Patterson and Eve Walker.

## Biology Olympiad 2013



The British Biology Olympiad challenges and stimulates pupils with an interest in Biology to expand and extend their talents. In offering a wider syllabus than A-level, it allows pupils to demonstrate their knowledge and to be suitably rewarded and publicly recognised by the award of medals, certificates and other prizes. It is hoped that competing in the Olympiad will encourage pupils already interested in this valuable, wide-ranging and rewarding subject to continue their study beyond A-level.

Seven Year 13 Biology pupils; Anna Chisholm, Amy Harrison-Potts, Hayley Boal, Laura Routledge, Katie Barraclough, Sarah Norman and Imogen Simpson took part in the British Biology Olympiad for the first time this year. The two-hour-long multiple choice test was taken on-line in the first week of February and was set by the Society of Biology.

The questions tested girls on areas covered in the Advanced level specification as well as some topics beyond, aimed at more talented biologists.

## NATIONAL SPACE CENTRE

The Science Department are all looking forward to our Mission on July 17th taking Year 10 to the National Space Centre in Leicester.

We will also visit the adjacent Victorian Water Works.

### Mission Objectives

Scientific: Learn more about Earth, Planets, Space, Life, the Universe and Everything Historical: Appreciate the importance of clean water to the progress of Society.

I'm sure we will all enjoy the exhibits and the Planetarium show - 'We are Aliens'.



Some questions were basic recall but the majority required interpretation of data and deduction. The 100 top scorers in the country were invited to take a second paper and the top sixteen would be asked to take practical tests to select a team of four to represent the UK at the International Biology Olympiad (IBO) in Switzerland. The IBO seeks to challenge by both theory and practical tests some of the top pre-university biology pupils in the world, with 60 countries taking part.

All of our pupils did very well on a very difficult test which asked questions about subjects as diverse as plant and animal physiology, genetics and evolution, cell biology, ethology, ecology and biosystematics. Amy Harrison-Potts, Katie Barraclough and Sarah Norman just missed out on the Bronze award by a couple of marks and received Highly Commended certificates, and Hayley Boal received a Commended award. Well done to all pupils who took part.

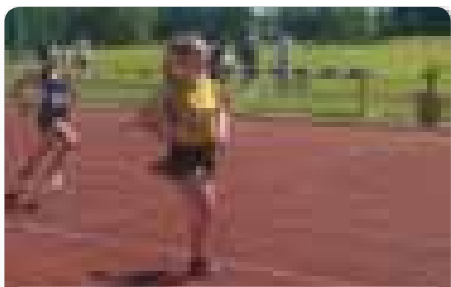
### County Athletics

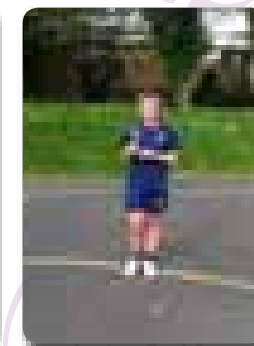

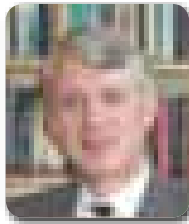


**Hexham and Newcastle Catholic Partnership Event at Durham University**

The pupils explored 'good and bad religion' as well as looking into the basis of ethics, the interpretation of religious texts, science and religion, and the origins of the universe.

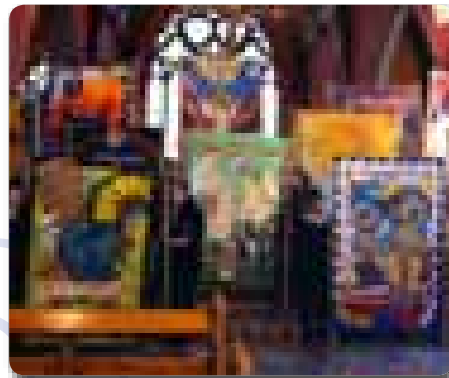

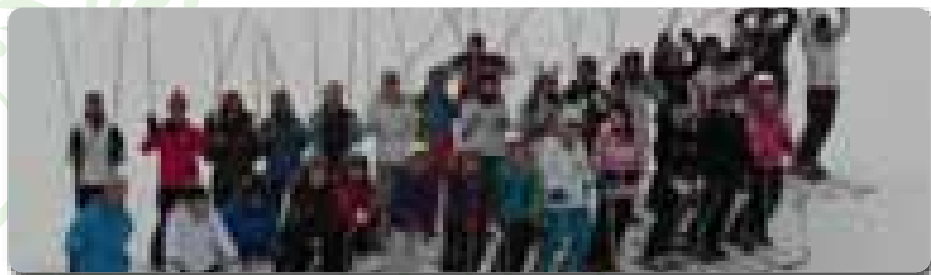
## Italy

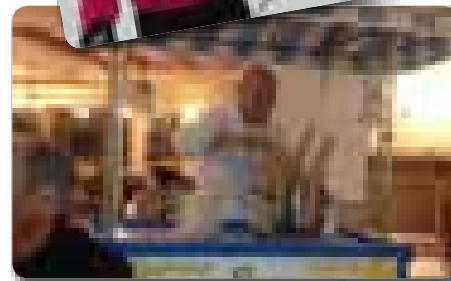
