## Welcome to Spotlight on St Anthony's

Dear Parents.

2012-2013 was a great summer of excellent examination results for our students:

#### **Amazing Advanced levels!**

We really did smash all records this summer with our A level results. You can study 36 different A levels at St. Anthony's and results across all subject areas were really excellent with an amazing 35% of all entries graded A\*/A and 82% graded A%-C.

#### **Great GCSEs!**

Success then followed for our GCSE students with 32% of all passes graded A\*/A and 84% A\*-C.

#### Fabulous new facilities!

We opened McAuley House (Phase 2) with its amazing ICT facility and more new classrooms. Supported by the Education Funding Agency, Keir have submitted a planning application for the phased redevelopment of the rest of the site 2014-2016.

#### Very varied visits!

The programme of events and visits continues at pace. Students have been involved in an exchange visit to India and a trip to Barcelona to name just two in the last two weeks as well as our usual annual geography field trips, history visits etc.

#### Fabulous fundraisers!

Our staff and students continue to be avid fundraisers who connect at local, regional, national and international level through charitable work.

As I write (II.II.2013) we marked Armistice Day with two minutes' silence, raised funds for 'The Coming Home Campaign' which adapts the homes of service personnel who have lost limbs during conflict, and held a 'Good Cup of Tea Day' to raise money for the work of



Mercy Sisters across the globe within education, as well as working with the sick, the poor, and trafficked women, just to name a few international projects the Mercy Sisters are involved in.

#### **Proactive Partners!**

Through the Hexham and Newcastle RC Partnership, our students are involved in a host of activities with students from thirteen secondary schools within the diocese. A huge range of competitions and activities are arranged e.g. Art Exhibition, University Challenge, English Speaking Union Debates, Shakespeare Smash, Masterchef, Cross-Country, Swimming, Badminton, Sailing Regatta, to name a few of the numerous sporting competitions.

## NEW SCHOOL PLANNING APPLICATION 2013

#### **BUILDING PROGRAMME 2014-2016**

We have decided to forego our usual "Alumni Spot" (for one edition only) to share with you very important information regarding the phased redevelopment of the school site. Following the successful opening of McAuley (Phase 2) 2013 we are delighted to share with you further information regarding the redevelopment of the remainder of the school site as part of the government's "Priority Schools Building Programme".

Senior staff and trustees have been working for some time with The Education Funding Agency and the appointed contractor, Keir. Final proposals are now going to City of Sunderland Planning Department this month. Many neighbours, and members of the community, were able to attend the Public Consultation held at the school on Wednesday 5th November from 2.30-7pm prior to the planning application.

The new school, if planning permission is granted, will retain and refurbish many existing historic buildings as well as our new McAuley building, but will see the demolition of a number of buildings dating from the 1950s, 1960s and 1970s following the completion of new school buildings in the centre of the site.

A few summary highlights from this programme:

- New Science and Technology laboratories and specialist facilities
- A new Hall, Drama facility and Chapel
- A new Sports Hall and additional external space for Sport and PE
- A new school kitchen and dining area
- New classrooms for all subjects
- Much more external space, garden areas, etc.

2014 is a significant year in the school's history. As well as starting our new building programme we also celebrate our 110th year as a school providing 11-18 education for girls within the City of Sunderland.

A cleverly designed programme of works ensures that the contractor, working with the Education Funding Agency and the school, deliver this programme with the minimum disruption to the community. I am sure all parents will be delighted that St. Anthony's is at long last acquiring the top class new facilities that students, staff and the whole community have so long deserved.



## **ENGLISH**

It's a chance to learn physically, in a practical way, discussing our ideas as a group, and giving our opinions and ideas and feelings on different situations. Working in the Educare Room, it's like being in a totally different world: it almost doesn't feel like school at all!'


## The Academy's International Link - update November 13

The Academy continues to develop its international links; it maintains and builds on existing links and also takes on new relationships with schools and organizations abroad. The items below provide a flavour of developments in this area.

#### China

St. Anthony's is aware of the growing importance of links with China and the study of Mandarin. We are working with the Local Authority and a group of Sunderland schools to host a visit by 6 Chinese teachers. The final dates are still to be confirmed but could be before Christmas 2013. The teachers will be accompanied by a Deputy Director of Education and a translator.

## India - British Council Connecting Classrooms Project



#### Korea

For the second year running the school is part of a team of schools from the North East of England working with Creativity Culture and Education in teacher exchange visits with Korean teachers as part of their Creative Partnerships in Education programme. Their Korean partners for this exchange are the International Teacher Exchange Team at Asia-Pacific Centre of Education for International Understanding, (APCEIU), under the auspices of UNESCO, as part of their Teaching Abroad for Global Competency.

Miss Katie Brown visited Korea for 3 weeks in June / July 2013 and enjoyed a varied programme of events. Mrs Helen Hoey and Mr Chris Malkin will host Korean teachers in St. Anthony's in January before they visit Korea in July 2014.

#### **Mercy International**

St. Anthony's Girls' Catholic Academy is a Mercy school and the Sisters continue to play an important part as trustees, as



foundation governors and as chaplains. There is also a Sister who is a member of the teaching staff. We continue to liaise with the work of Mercy International.

We hold an annual "Good cup of tea" day when past and present staff get together to share refreshments. All proceeds go to Mercy International.

#### **S**pain

In the spring term we prepared a joint bid for Comenius Funding from the European Union to enable



St. Anthony's and our partners' school in Torrijos, near Madrid, to do pupil exchanges for the next two years. While the British Council approved our side of the bid, the Spanish authorities did not so we could not go ahead. We continue to seek funding to develop student exchanges. We have recently been approached by a school near Granada to consider an exchange of students and are looking closely into that. The teacher involved, Carmen Rodrigues de la Cruz, spent a year in St. Anthony's as a Foreign Language Assistant in 1991 and has maintained links with staff over the years.

## Sweden - University of Linnaeus

The partnership between the Academy and this prestigious Swedish university has been established for nearly a decade. We regularly welcome initial teacher trainee teachers for visits of up to two weeks. We are hoping to organise a visit by staff from St. Anthony's to Sweden for a programme of visits to schools sometime in the Summer term 2014.

## Teaching Abroad for Global Competency 2013



Miss Katie Brown, Deputy Subject Leader for Design and Technology has been part of an International Exchange to South Korea.

Ms. Sun Mi YUN form Guwol Girls' Middle School, Incheon, arrived in the UK in January 2013. She visited St. Anthony's during the week and spent time observing a variety of lessons. Sun Mi then planned and delivered a Chemistry lesson to Year 7 on the production of "Bopki" a traditional Korean snack, similar to cinder toffee. Sun Mi's team also taught a lesson to Miss Brown's Year 13 Product Design class on the history of Korea and also gave them the opportunity to make traditional Korean papercraft "Hanbok".



On her return visit in June 2013, Miss Brown visited the city of Incheon on the North West coast of South Korea and spent 3 weeks working in Guwol Girls' Middle School. Miss Brown observed practice in range of lessons including some more traditional lessons such as Chinese and Japanese Character. Miss Brown then delivered lessons in Textiles. All grade 8 students within the school had a 1 hour

lesson with Miss Brown on the History of the United Kingdom, Popular Culture and Textiles. All students made a pin badge to take away with them as a souvenir of their experience.



#### Links with India Grow and Grow

We have continued to build on our links with KVKV School in Rajkot, Gujarat, India. In July the Head Teacher, Ms Sonal Shah, spent 10 days in St. Anthony's visiting classes and doing some presentations on Indian life, observing lessons and following a varied cultural programme. One of the most interesting features of the visit was having Indian students observing 4 lessons in Technology live via a Skype link.

In October midterm Mr Flores, Mr Jordan and 4 students, Emily Best, Mollie Rennoldson, Caitlin Strong and Rebecca Toomey spent 10 days visiting KVKV School. During their time there they did three activities with different groups of students. These included short plays in English and French on the theme of the environment, workshop activities using Photoshop and designing a ruler using 2D Design. The rulers have then been manufactured in St. Anthony's and sent to India.



## **International Links**

The group also enjoyed a very varied programme. A visit to a poppadum factory, a seminar in an animation studio, handling snakes in a snake sanctuary and a 3-hour drive round the Gir Forest Nature Reserve to see the lions living in the wild.

One of the highlights of the programme was an evening cultural event for over 1,000 spectators. Three of the students, (Emily Best, Caitlin Strong and Rebecca Toomey) learnt the Dandia dance and performed it with the KVKV dance group wearing their own costumes. Mollie Rennoldson performed two songs. Mr. Flores sang a Gujarati folk song for which he had been ruthlessly coached! An excellent time was had by all.

The teachers and students enjoyed wonderful hospitality and made many friends during their visit. Both schools have reapplied for funding from the

British Council to build on these links in 2013-14.

#### **Year 12 Induction Residential**


In September Year 12 pupils started Sixth Form with an overnight stay at the Youth Village in Consett. This has become an annual event and was a great opportunity for pupils to make new

## SCIENCE SPACE CENTREVISIT MISSION ACCOMPLISHED!



The first Science Department Mission to explore the National Space Centre in Leicester blasted off on schedule in July with a crew of hundreds of excited Year 10 Antonauts and Y12 Physicists ready for 'The Greatest Mission upon which Man has ever embarked' (JFK 1961)

Launch was actually delayed slightly as vital Antonaut Crew supplies of trays of bacon baps were ferried to the Launch Pad by the Ground Crew.



The Space fleet set off for planet Leicester with the film Apollo 13 for in-flight entertainment.

The Apollo missions cost \$175 billion and took 3.5 days to travel 235,000 miles to visit the Moon. The

Antonaut mission cost £25 and took 3.5 hours to travel 180 miles to visit Moon rock – much better value!

The Space Centre is full of original rockets and satellites, interactive displays, massive models of planets, life-size Space Station modules, simulated Mars Surface, Shuttle Blast-off Area and many more Displays and Exhibitions.



The Planetarium show 'We Are Aliens' was so good that many of the Antonauts signed up for the next show as soon as the first ended.

Queues formed for the amazing 'Planet Crash Landing' Simulator where we were definitely shaken and stirred!

The Weather Centre proved very popular with Antonauts operating in front of blue screens to give Weather updates which were then transmitted on TV.

A return Mission is scheduled for July 2014 for current Y10 and Y12 – so get in training for your Space Walk as the next set of Antonauts!


