Welcome to Spotlight on St Anthony's

New school update – November 2014

Our new school is being built as part of work undertaken by the Education Funding Agency (EFA) on behalf of the Secretary of State for Education. The structural steelwork is being erected to plan and to time for the main new school building. The whole project is reaching an exciting stage with staircases and floors now being visible within the structure.



We will be moving into this main new school building during October half term 2015. **Students will have a two week "half term" October 2015 to enable us to undertake this major move. This two week half term break will consist of the usual half term holiday week (Monday 26th October – Friday 30th October 2015) combined with the week prior (Monday 19th October to Friday 23rd October 2015).** This "extra" week combines a single "moving day" with four of our annual staff training days.



New School Building Programme



This two week October half term 2015 may also be of help to parents wishing to book a holiday during October. It is a “one-off” for 2015 and is purely to enable us to pack and move from the old school into the new. **Students will “break up” from school on Friday 16th October 2015 and return on Monday 2nd November 2015.** The last time we moved schools was the summer of 1939 (prior to the outbreak of the Second World War from Green Street to our current site). I am sure we won't be moving again in any of our lifetimes!

Once we move into the main new building in October 2015 the remaining stages of the

construction project will take place October 2015 – Spring 2016. This includes some refurbishment of the historic Westburn and Somerleyton buildings and the demolition of some buildings not included in our new school site. The construction of the Sports Hall (including four courts) and a dance studio will also take place. The contractor will also be working on the landscaping, car parking, and creation of external games areas etc. The whole project is due for total completion in the summer 2016.

BTEC Business Placements 2013

Year 12 BTEC Business pupils have started their work placements and are enjoying the challenges placement work can bring: early mornings, hard work and lots of valuable work experience! This year there are 8 girls on the BTEC Business course and each of them have chosen work-experience placements that offer them an insight into what working in a real-life job might be like when they are older.

The girls have chosen a wide variety of placements – from primary schools to parcel delivery offices – and even though it's early days, all are enjoying themselves.

Melissa Chapman, Kasie Hill and Emily Pearson are all enjoying placements at their old primary school. Kasie, who is at English Martyrs RC Primary said 'I really like being back at my old primary school, I loved it so much when I was younger I wanted to see what it was like coming back to help out by being a Teaching Assistant.' Melissa is at St John Bosco's where she is helping out in the main office.

'I am really enjoying working in the main office and am learning about the day-to-day procedures of how the office is run. I am learning a lot of new office

skills that will help me to get a job when I am older.'

Kennedy Ross is working within the Coroners Office at Sunderland Council. 'Working in the administration section is really exciting – no two days are the same! The people I am working with are all really nice and I feel like part of the team already. I like working in a team of people where we all pull together to get a job done. I didn't know what to expect when I started the placement but I absolutely love it and I am learning lots of new skills that I will definitely use when I am older.'

Sophie Smith is working at Buttercups Nursery where she has quickly become a valuable member of the team. Lesley-Ann, the Nursery Manager said 'Sophie has been a really good support to staff so far. She knows the children and understands the room routines and she will always ask if she is unsure about anything. Business & Economics

Year 12 – CIPFA Business Competition

On 7th November 2014 seven highly motivated Year 12 students accepted the challenge and took part in the Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy Challenge hosted at Carmel College in Darlington. The challenge required them to work as a team to read through a pre-release case study and assign job roles to each other before the event took place. During the competition the students had to work together

and decide which services to cut in a fictional local council area, in response to a brief that they were given on the day.

They then had to deal with media, trade unions and local councillors, as well as various obstacles put in their way throughout the process that require them to re-evaluate their position on the decisions made. They successfully worked as a team, each member recognising their individual strengths and responsibilities and used these effectively throughout the process, which allowed them to exchange and discuss ideas, to work independently on their job role as well as well as develop their ICT skills through the internet research and the final report, presentation and press release that they had to create.

The girls worked extremely well and now benefit from a developed understanding of the complexities of working within public services. Sophia Robinson was awarded for her hard work and focus throughout the day. However all the girls (Eleanor Ash, Jennifer Connolly, Lydia Ellison, Sophie Jackson, Georgia Maw, Sophia Robinson and Drew Summerside), developed their presentation and team-working skills while working towards the overall objectives.



Year 12 – Business & Economics IFS Challenge

St. Anthony's is entering three teams into the IFS Challenge, where each team will be given a virtual £100,000 that they have to spend on buying shares in companies on a stock market game. The students will have to monitor what is happening in the UK and world economies and the business world in general to ensure that they make the right decisions when it comes to buying and selling their shares.

First prize for the competition is a trip to New York as well as receiving cash prizes for themselves and the school. This exercise is a brilliant way of bringing business and economic theory and putting it into practice and learning the role of a stock broker. Year 13 – Accountancy Competition – HNCP

Charlotte Behan, Brenna Grey, Kate Lormor, Sophie Maddison and Emma Wilkinson all took part in the Hexham and Newcastle Catholic Partnership Business, Accounting & Skills competition on 14th July 2014 at St. Joseph's School in Hebburn. This day was planned as a competition to enhance and engage students in the world of business, accounting and finance. The team had to analyse a case study, identify challenges, offer solutions and present their findings to a panel of judges. The students developed problem solving skills, providing financial advice to the fictional business in the case study, to decide whether it should be located in the UK or abroad. The team were placed fourth in the competition and have been able to apply the analytical and evaluation skills that they learnt on the day to their coursework and exam preparation.

Childcare Students in Year 13 are currently undertaking their practical placements in a range of Day Care settings around the city, which include Tavistock House Day Nursery and Busy Bees, working with children aged from a few weeks to 5 years.

The girls are finding this not only physically demanding but very rewarding and have experienced seeing children reach their milestones such as first steps and first words.

The girls have been very busy observing the children's development, planning activities and learning opportunities as well as facing the challenges of feeding times, making bottles and settling children to sleep.

Dealing with distressed babies and nappy-changing has been all in a day's work for some of them.

Although it is hard juggling their placements and coping with academic work the girls' responses are very positive.

Cooking and Nutrition

'Compulsory Cooking for all'

St Anthony's are celebrating food, cooking and nutrition being made compulsory this year for all the pupils as part of the new National Curriculum and School Food Plan, starting in 2014.

Food teachers are very happy that it has been recognised how vital Food lessons are for pupils' health and well-being. Pupils learn about where food comes from, how it is grown and produced, how it is prepared and cooked, and the science behind nutrition, food safety, cooking and taste. In Year 7 we focus on "Me-sized meals;" teaching about healthy eating and how pupils can improve their diets, particularly eating more fruits and vegetables. In Year 8, the project is called "Teenage Teas;" students learn a wide range of cooking techniques and cuisines from around the world. By Year 9 they are confident enough to create and modify recipes to make them tastier and healthier" and the first project students work on is developing a new bread product for a supermarket bakery.

As a treat 9 SA brought in ingredients from home to bake cup cakes to sell in aid of their Year group charity. Students raised over £30 – Well done! A big thank you to parents for supporting this good cause.

Years 7, 8 and 9 students entered a Halloween style Great British Bake Off where they competed to see who could decorate the spookiest and scariest cupcakes. The cupcake were sold in aid of Manzini and raised close to £80. Well done to everyone who took part.

National Theatre War Horse Project

In the Spring and Summer terms, students in Year 12 were given the fantastic opportunity to work with the National Theatre Education department to create a performance commemorating the centenary of the outbreak of World War I. Having attended two workshops and a performance of 'War Horse', we were given the brief to create a piece of theatre of our choice. Our two groups – one studying English Literature and one studying Drama – took very different approaches, creating two contrasting but equally thoughtful pieces. The first used letters to follow a soldier's experiences of war, and was based on the students' own family history research. The second focused on the lives of the women left behind, coping with the news from the Front.

We chose a variety of performance approaches – shadow theatre, projection, soundtracks, narration, voice-overs, monologues and improvised text – to create our pieces. Hollie Coxon and Anthony Hope from the Sunderland Empire's Creative Learning team helped us to realise our ideas. A culmination event was held in July at 'The Canny Space' – the former Holy Trinity Church in Sunderland's East End where we spent the whole day rehearsing and then gave two performances to invited guests. Ours were the last two pieces in the programme. The audience commented afterwards on how powerful, moving and thought-provoking they found them. We were surprised and delighted with the response we got and amazed at how far we'd come from the initial ideas we'd had. Truly an experience we won't forget!

Geography

Year 12 River Residential

They measured features of the river at three separate locations, such as its width, velocity and gradient, looking at the different landforms at each place. They then went back to the accommodation and worked hard to analyse their results, drawing graphs and cross sections and also trying some statistical techniques! The following morning they visited the village of Lealholm to practice their field sketches, but not before having a lovely English breakfast cooked by Mr. Hermon!

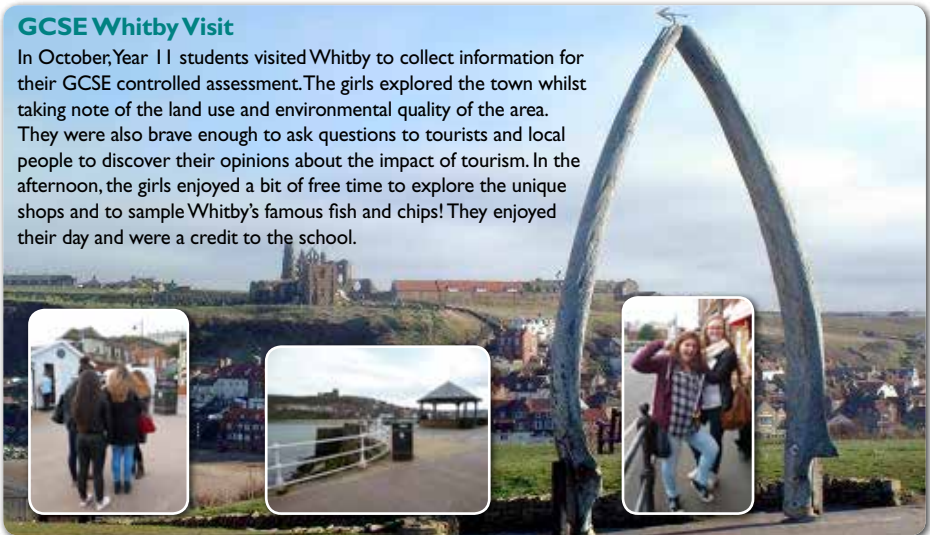


Year 7 Photography Competition

Y9 pupils have started studying WWI by looking at how the centenary of the outbreak of the war has been remembered. The girls looked at the different ways it has been commemorated and came up with their own ways of remembering this event. Pupils created some very thoughtful and imaginative ideas, including recreating trenches to give people an understanding of what troops went through, building a ceramic poppy tree in Mowbray Park and releasing balloons assigned to regiments and then burst, releasing red and gold glitter to represent poppies and the men who died during the war.

History Club students have been working to fill a time capsule to commemorate the new school building. The time capsule will be provided by Kier, the building company, and a burial ceremony is planned for later this year. International Links

Korean Teacher Exchange 2014

In July, Mrs Hoey and Mr Malkin took part in the second phase of the South Korean Teacher Exchange Programme, which had seen Korean teachers invited to the Academy in January. While in Korea, Mrs Hoey and Mr Malkin were given the opportunity to explore Korean culture which included spending 3 weeks in a Korean school.

Over the course of the 3 weeks, the pair visited a number of cities, including Seoul, Busan and Changwon, where they became immersed in the culture of the country. They were able to sample local food, visit many of the country's ancient and beautiful landmarks and even try on some traditional Korean dress.

Mr Malkin was placed in a high school (the equivalent to our Year 11 and Sixth Form) where he taught lessons in British Culture and Maths. Mrs Hoey worked in a Middle School (Years 8 to 10) and taught British Culture and History. Both were able to observe Korean teaching and were observed by up to 20 teachers at any one time, with the aim of helping the Korean teachers to develop more creative teaching styles.

Despite spending over 24 hours on flights and averaging around 5 hours sleep per night, they both had an incredible experience and would go back in a heartbeat!

We use a computer programme called Accelerated Reader which enables us to pick books from the library and then take a quiz on them.

The aim of our club is to get ourselves "caught reading." Not all books are fun for everyone so at Reading Club it's about finding books that we find interesting and not too hard to read. This term so far, we have taken over 182 quizzes and earned 88.1 points between us. We have also read over 460643 words.

Chatterbooks

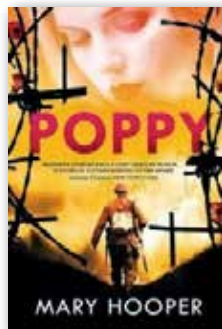

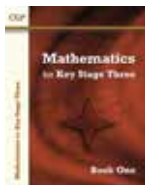
Students can login using any PC or laptop and the free Puffin Academy app allows them to access MyMaths on mobile and tablet devices.

Attendance in Year 11 is so important if you are to achieve your potential in your GCSE exams.

- a child who is absent a day of school per week misses an equivalent of two years of their school life
- 90% of young people with absence rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades of GCSE and around one third achieve no GCSEs at all
- poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable

It involved the pupils making paper chains bearing the words and phrases of difficulties we face, so some craft skills were involved. We are currently in the process of producing an art structure as a memorial to the millions of victims killed during the Holocaust, which will be available to view in the New Year.

Biology Visit to Body Worlds exhibition at the Centre for Life



On July 3rd 40 Year 12

Biology and Human Biology students visited the Centre for Life for the day. They also got the opportunity to see the visiting BODY WORLDS Vital exhibition which made its UK debut at Life in May 2014 and has been extended until January 4th 2015.

The specimens on display in the exhibition were generously donated and preserved through plastination, the preservation process invented by Dr. Gunther von Hagens in 1977, while he was working as an anatomist at the University of Heidelberg. Everyone thought that the exhibition was fascinating and it was amazing to see the complexity, intricacy and beauty of the human body. It was a great opportunity to learn about anatomy, physiology, and health by viewing real human specimens. The exhibition included whole-body plastinates, a large arrangement of individual organs, organ and arterial configurations, and translucent slices that gave a complete picture of how the human body works. Students also got a chance to explore how best to fight life-threatening diseases such as cancer, diabetes, and heart ailments, through healthy choices and lifestyle changes. Everyone agreed that it was a great learning opportunity to see the human body as more than simple diagrams in text books.

During their visit the students also took part in a DNA workshop, where they got the chance to extract some of their own DNA and make it into a pendant, and to construct model genes for organisms as diverse as oranges and sharks. Students also got a chance to tour the other exhibits in the Centre for Life and add to their knowledge of Human Genetics and evolution. Finally, a hectic tour of the Rainforest in the interactive ride left everyone pretty wet and giddy, and we learned about the competition to send a remote-controlled vehicle to the Moon in the planetarium. The day was both fascinating and enjoyable and brought many aspects of the Biology A Level curriculum to life for the students.

Congratulations to Sandra Sibby (Year 13) for being a successful applicant for the Nuffield Research Placement. Having made an online application (<http://www.nuffieldresearchplacements.org/>) during Year 12, Sandra received confirmation that she had been chosen during June 2014. Nuffield Research Placements (previously Nuffield Science Bursaries) provide over 1,000 students each year with the opportunity to work alongside professional scientists, technologists, engineers and mathematicians. Students in the first year of a post-16 Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) course are eligible to apply. Placements are available across the UK, in universities, commercial companies, voluntary organisations and research institutions.

Sandra was involved in a four-week project at Newcastle College during the whole of August. Some of the work was supported by her Project Provider, Mr Rhys Wilson, but a lot of the work was carried out independently by Sandra. The research project involved designing and making a portable, less expensive, gas chromatography machine to be used in schools.

The final stages of the project was to write a report of about four thousand words outlining what she had found out while completing the project, and to produce a poster summarising the whole project ready to be displayed on the evening of the ceremony. At the presentation ceremony Sandra was asked to present her findings to the audience. The project can be converted into a Gold CREST Award (<http://www.britishsienceassociation.org/crest-awards>) which is well recognised through UCAS applications.
