

Catholic Partnership Life Drawing at Sunderland University with Year 12

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Earlier in the academic year our Year 12 fine artists took on the challenge of completing a full day's workshop drawing the figure and portraits. These two subjects are notoriously difficult to handle but the outcomes produced by our students were exceptional. They have followed the footsteps of past students who have undertaken these classes, put on by the Catholic Partnership and Sunderland University, and have produced excellent work.

The day was a great success and it gave the girls a chance to explore a variety of drawing materials



from pencils to pastels, as well as refining their observational skills whilst looking at a live model, producing several figurative and portrait sketches. This work will be used to boost their A Level marks and give our students valuable experience of what Art at university level entails. Perhaps, more importantly, it was good fun! As is so often the case with Art, the day was sadly over too soon; however, the girls have a fantastic grounding in figurative drawing to bring back into their class work portfolios, and this experience is one which will not be forgotten quickly.



At the end of the day, the girls were very appreciative of their experience and thanks must go to the excellent organisation of both the Catholic Partnership and Sunderland University.


Art and Photography Representation at the Antonian Awards

Super Sisters!

Congratulations to our super sisters Lilly and Emmie Thompson for their artistic efforts and creative outcomes.

Lilly (Year 10) has shown a keen eye for photography and has already had past success in the Hexham and Newcastle Catholic Partnership Exhibition two years running. Her work has also been featured in the Sunderland Echo and she has already held her first solo exhibition at the Customs House in South Shields. She has an up-coming exhibition at the Arts Centre in Washington entitled "School Days" held in the Granary Gallery from 13th May to 25th June 2016. This will be a fantastic display of creativity and a great opportunity for



the general public to experience some of the talent we have here at St.Anthony's Girls' Catholic Academy. On top of this she was also a winner of the Youth Arts Exhibition in the 11-14 age category. Her winning photograph is part of the exhibition which will run from 15th January to 27th February 2016. As a result of her success she will now attend a celebration at the Stadium of Light to receive a Sunderland Young Achievers Art Award.



Emmie (Year 11) is also a keen artist, producing several excellent paintings, drawings and even animated films. She has a back catalogue of awards stemming from her time in Year 7 through to her current and most recent projects which include designing new workplaces for the Nissan plant here in Sunderland, winning two Sunderland Young Achievers Awards, having her work exhibited twice at the Hexham and Newcastle Catholic Partnership Exhibition in Durham Cathedral and winning a Google backed e-safety competition where her animations were used as an educational film. This resource is now available for all schools across the UK. Emmie continues to seek out new opportunities in order to broaden her artistic range, experience and skill, recently embarking on a work placement at Kuro Dragon Animation in the Northern Design Centre, Gateshead, in order to receive some invaluable work experience in animation, a career Emmie would like to pursue in the future.

Perhaps the strongest aspect of the girl's performance however, comes when they put both of their creative talents together and work as a team. The girls have worked tirelessly on an animation called "Mitchell Goldfield". This was hand drawn, frame by frame, without any guidance or previous experience. The girls submitted this animation to the Berwick-Upon-Tweed Film and Media Arts Festival and to their surprise they won the Young Filmmakers Award. Since then the animation has become an award winning sensation travelling across the UK to several exhibitions in Northern and Southern Ireland, the BFI on London's Southbank, South Shields Customs House, Leeds Young Film Festival, and the girls have even walked the red

carpet in Leister Square at the INTO Film Awards held at the prestigious Empire Theatre. Recently they have been selected as finalists in the 2016 Journal Culture Awards. The awards will take place on 26th April at Sunderland Minster. The girls say "We feel honoured to be nominated for a Journal Culture Award. Being a part of something that celebrates Art and Culture in our local area is a massive achievement for both of us". Well done girls; and keep up the hard work!

Pupils worked with business mentors and representatives from Coca Cola, designing a local tidy campaign and a smart app. The girls had the daunting task of presenting their ideas to everyone. The challenge was difficult but a brilliant insight into the world of business and enterprise. Well done girls.

Year 7 Enterprise Competition

A large group of year 7 pupils took part in an enterprise competition where teams set up mini-enterprises selling Christmas-themed products with the money raised going to the charity Lepra. The girls came up with creative ideas for products, sold the products at a sales event, created sales stands and gave a presentation about their experience. It was extremely difficult to make a decision as all girls involved did an amazing job; but the winning group was 'The Wishful Thinkers' with team members: Michelle Lim, Katie Craig, Beth Connors, Lucy Jones, Jennifer Kirsop, Madaline Forbister and Emily Cowie.



The team produced an outstanding product mix, including knitted sweet-filled Christmas puddings, rice-filled decorated snowmen, decorated boxes of sweets, cocoa and marshmallow reindeers, and starshaped cookies. Their sales stand and presentation displayed effective organisational and teamwork skills.

Micro Tyco - Wild Heart **Challenge and Deloitte**

A group of enthusiastic Year 12 students took up the Wild Heart Micro Tyco Challenge. They were given £1 start-up fund and had to use their initiative to invest it appropriately to raise

as much money as possible. By starting up a cake business as well as a number of other business ventures, the girls were able to raise over £500, which has been sent to Wild Heart.

Wild Heart supports people in the Third World by providing them with business loans (just over £200) to set up and run their own businesses. Women generally take advantage of this opportunity, in order to set up a business to support their families. Unbelievably, 75% of women throughout the world do not have access to money and/or banking facilities. The businesses are generally small but effective, like beekeeping/honey-making and clothes alteration services, which allows them to pay their rent, clothe their children, pay for medical care, and also to employ other people and make a difference to their local community.

Toni Bevan, Samantha Chapman, Alyanna Eligio, Georgia Herron and Tayla Wilkinson all completed the challenge and submitted their diaries to finalise the competition. Their diaries highlighted their determination and their problem-solving skills as they faced a number of barriers to the challenge which they had to overcome, as well as demonstrate their entrepreneurial skills. As a result of their hard work all five students have successfully gained a work experience placement at Deloitte (one of the UK's biggest accountancy firms) in the Summer. This is an amazing achievement and a great reward for all of their hard work.

Using the information from the presentations, the girls completed over a period of several Thursday lunchtimes in the DT department, a huge amount of hard work. This was submitted in a presentation format to the competition organiser — Construction Industry Council.

The girls developed their own construction company, named 'Padua Construction,' which made strong links to our school. The girls also designed the company logo (pictured above) and all the branding, as well as an engineered plan of a new housing estate located on a local brownfield site in Sunderland. They also developed architectural drawings of the two different types of modular housing and brought it all together with a detailed CAD model (pictured right) of the whole estate.





The girls are still waiting to hear from the competition organisers to see if they have been successful and shortlisted for the final which will be held on 29th of June! Good luck, girls!

Design Club – Jamie's Italian Competition

The members of the Design Club are currently working on their entry to submit to Jamie Oliver's interior design competition which requires students to locate a disused local building and transform it into a unique Jamie's Italian restaurant!

So far the girls have identified the Old Elvet Swimming Baths in Durham as an ideal location: close to the city centre and shops, and easily accessible.

The plan is to transform this beautiful old building into a multilevelled eatery that will be a busy family restaurant by day, and will have a more romantic ambience by night.

Industrial Cadets

During March a group of 16 Year 9 students attended a week long Industrial Cadets course at The Skills Academy for Sustainable Manufacturing and Innovation, a part of Gateshead College based at Nissan.

During the week the students were introduced to many techniques used in industry when mass-producing products to ensure that the products are made quickly, and to the required quality standards.

The task involved two teams setting themselves up as a production line to see how long it took them to produce 15 model cars, which were then tested for quality. At the start of the week the students were taking nearly an hour to make one car, but by applying what they learned during the week, by the end of it, the teams managed to achieve the task of producing 15 cars on a production line in 45 minutes!

All the girls taking part gained the Silver Industrial Cadets award as well as valuable UCAS points which they can use in the future to help their university applications.




Duke of Edinburgh Award 2016-2017


English

History & Politics

History Visit to Berlin



Over the Easter break, 40 Year 11 pupils took part in a visit to Berlin as part of their study of Nazi Germany, along with Mr McVay, Mr Malkin, Mrs Almond and Miss Horner. They visited the Reichstag, the Brandenburg Gate, the Jewish Museum, and many other sites during their stay. The pupils were particularly moved by their visit to Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp and Wannsee, where pupils dealt with some difficult issues but were very mature throughout. At the Wannsee Conference Centre, the pupils were taught about the treatment of leading Nazis after 1945. This was an area of Germany's history that they had very little knowledge of, and all pupils found it very interesting to find out what happened to those who had committed such heinous crimes during World War Two. Particularly interesting for both staff and pupils was the visit to the Topography of Terror. Built close to where the Gestapo headquarters in Berlin was once situated, the informative guides explained how the Nazis used methods of terror to control the German population. Both the pupils and the staff really enjoyed the visit and pupils commented on how much they enjoyed seeing the sites that they discuss in class.

Celebrations for the Queen's Birthday - History Competition

To celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday, Year 7 took part in a competition to produce a poster on 'the most successful Queen'. They studied Queens who had ruled in their own right, identifying success criteria by which to judge them. Many wonderful entries were submitted on Queen Elizabeth I, Elizabeth II and Queen Anne. 
Pupil Librarian Scheme

- poor examination results limit young people's options and poor attendance suggests to colleges and employers that these students are unreliable





Edinburgh: Conference for A Level students: "Science and Pseudo-science"

- The Psychology of Magic and Illusion. Magicians appear to make solid objects vanish into thin air, defy the laws of gravity and predict the future. Professor Richard Wiseman invites you to step backstage and discover the secret science of sorcery.
- Andrew Newton is one of the most successful and experienced hypnotists in the world. Andrew demonstrates the use of hypnosis whilst giving some interesting academic insights into how this process works on a psychological level. The audience are invited to participate.

Sociology

This has been another excellent year for the Sociology Department. We are thrilled to have two classes in Year 12 for the first time. The current Year 12 took the first exam of the new 'A' levels in May and we wish them luck.

Year 13 have been lucky enough to have a range of interesting talks arranged for them.

In November Professor Simon Winlow spoke to our students about his very famous and influential study of bouncers in Sunderland 'Badfellas'. He talked about the economic and social conditions which influenced the types of crime in Sunderland, and he gave a fascinating insight into the way he undertook his study. All of these issues are relevant to our Paper 4 which covers Crime and Deviance, and to our Research Methods Linked to Crime. Professor Winlow also discussed with us some of the other issues he has been researching involving changes in politics both here in the UK, and also in Europe as a whole.

Crime Day 2016!

In January we headed off to the annual Carmel College Crime Day, where a host of speakers discussed the findings of their work. One of them was Jim Cunningham, a retired PC who spoke about the widening of the definition of domestic abuse, and the impact it will have on policing and crime figures.



In March, the Durham PCC Ron Hogg also came to speak to Yr 13 about policing and the role of the PCC. Mr Hogg himself has a background in Sociology, and provided a fascinating discussion on the pros and cons of the legalisation of certain banned substances.

Several of our pupils are going on to study Sociology at university. We wish all Yr I 3 students every success in their future.

'I get it!' was one of the many positive comments from the girls after Adrian Brook's wonderful talk on the importance of Mass and the Eucharist. Adrian engaged pupils with creative activities and most of all his own passion for the faith.

As we are a girls' academy Fr. Marc Lyden-Smith, in his excellent session, thought it very important that the students hear about some female Catholic role models, such as St. Therese of Lisieux and other 'heroic women'.

Three Bronze Awards in the British Biology Olympiad

This year over 7,200 students from around 600 schools took part in the British Biology Olympiad (BBO) including ten of our own Year 13 Biology students. The test consisted of two very challenging one-hour multiple choice papers taken online in school in February.

Improving on last year's success, three of our students, Dana Lim, Tamin Syeda and Hannah Mearns, have gained Bronze awards this year. They have been invited to the Royal Institution in

July for a Society of Biology Awards Ceremony with keynote speaker Professor Gail Cardew FRSB. In addition, Sarah Mearns achieved a certificate of High Commendation and Anna Greaves, Ann Andreas and Rachel Lim achieved Commendation certificates.

The top 150 gold medallists took part in round two of the BBO; a ninety-minute written paper at their schools in March, and then the 16 highest achievers took part in the British Final at the University of Warwick in April. A four-person team has been selected to represent the UK at the International Biology Olympiad (IBO) which will take place in Hanoi, Vietnam in July, and we wish them the best of luck.

The IBO seeks to challenge both theoretical knowledge and practical skill of some of the top pre-university Biology students in the world, with over 60 countries taking part. UK teams have had considerable success at IBO in previous years and maybe one year one of our own St. Anthony's students may achieve a place on the team.

This was another record-breaking year for participation, and the standard of entries was very high so competition was tough and grade boundaries were high. Many congratulations to Dana, Tamin and Hannah who have already received their medals and certificates and are hoping to attend the Awards Ceremony in London this Summer.

Biology Visit to Body Worlds Animal Inside Out Exhibition at the Centre for Life

On July 5th thirty eight Year 12 Biology students will visit the Centre for Life for the day. They will get the opportunity to see the visiting BODY WORLDS Animal Inside Out and take part in a Rat Dissection Masterclass.

The specimens on display in the exhibition were generously donated and preserved through plastination, the preservation process invented by Dr. Gunther von Hagens in 1977, while he was working as an anatomist at the University of Heidelberg. It will be a great opportunity to learn about anatomy, physiology, and health by viewing real animal specimens. The exhibition includes whole-body plastinates, a large arrangement of individual organs, organ and arterial configurations, and translucent slices that gave a complete picture of physiology.

This is a great learning opportunity to see anatomy as more than simple diagrams in text books. During their visit the students will also take part in a rat dissection workshop which will develop their dissection skills as part of the new A Level specification. We hope to have a fascinating and enjoyable day that brings many different aspects of the Biology A Level Curriculum to life.

The Microbiology

How microbes work for us



In Schools Advisory Committee introduced a competition to enhance student interest in Microbiology in 1985. This year was the 28th **MiSAC Annual Poster Competition** for Key Stages 3 and 4 and attracted 654 entries from 104 schools nationally. This year's

topic was linked to the National Curriculum but aimed to broaden students' approach. Sponsorship money prizes, totalling £1,200 for students and their schools, were provided by the Society for Applied Microbiology.

The aim of the competition was to produce a popular news story about ways in which microbes work to our advantage, using a lively, fun and entertaining approach modelled on an internet news media site such as BuzzFeed. Entries had to be a poster on one A3

piece of paper and our entrants focused on production of biofuels, composting, genetic engineering to produce insulin, soil fertility and fermentation as an ancient method to preserve food in the form of Indian pickles. They certainly described many of the diverse ways that microbes are useful in our lives. We submitted two team entries from Year 10 and the students received a certificate of commendation for participating and some really positive feedback from the judges.

All five entrants received Highly Commended for the design, detail and research on their posters; they are: Riya Stephen, Devika Jayan, Ashlin Roy, Diana Sabu, Merin Benny.

Well done to the girls for their excellent entries which unfortunately did not win major prizes on this occasion, but were brilliant and showed great creativity and scientific knowledge.

We had been fund-raising for nearly 2 years to enable a group of Year 13 girls and 4 staff to work alongside Manzini Youth Care (MYC) in Manzini, Swaziland. Since then groups of students and staff have travelled out each year to continue to support the work of this amazing organisation.

It was on our first visit to Swaziland that we met the Founder of MYC Fr Larry McDonnell (on the left). To this day Fr Larry, now retired, works closely with us for the benefit of the vulnerable young people of Manzini. Fr Tim is the new Director of MYC and we look forward to meeting him this year and working alongside him on future projects.

We were also accompanied by Steve Wright. Steve was a policeman with Northumbria Police and he continues to support MYC in so many ways. Steve has also volunteered and delivered an important PSHE unit on Personal Safety to our Year 10's for the last twelve years — his contribution to the life at St Anthony's has been invaluable.



Another amazing supporter of MYC over the years has been Kev Gingell. Kev, a retired fire fighter, has accompanied the school on so many visits to Manzini. The children's homes are much improved as a result of Kev's fantastic DIY skills.





One of our regular jobs is to redecorate the many children's homes. We are never alone in this task, there are always willing volunteers from each home to lend a helping hand.



Lindiwe always looks forward to our visits. Funding has provided a fresh water supply to her home. Her vegetables are amazing and she is now able to share clean water with her neighbours. Other taps have also been installed in her homestead, making life so much easier for many within the community.



Manzini



One of our most successful projects has been to support the work of the pre-school trainee teachers. With the help of Mrs Miller, work is on-going to train local Swazi women who, when qualified, go out into their local communities to teach disadvantaged children who otherwise would not receive an education. This teacher training programme is renowned as being the best in Swaziland. Last year we met with the Senior Inspector of schools in Swaziland to discuss distance learning for future training with Sunderland University.



Supporting pupils and staff in education has always been a top priority for us here at St Anthony's. Each year opportunities are given for girls and staff to teach in Enjabulweni Bridging School. Many of our girls have gone on to teach with other voluntary organisations throughout the world as a result of their experiences in Manzini.

We regularly work with staff from
Enjabulweni School supporting teaching
and staff development and many friendships
have been forged over the years.
The majority of money raised from St. Anthonys is
now sent to MYC to pay teacher's salaries.

Cedric is a teacher at Enjabulweni School. His choir and Marimba and Drumming Band continue to be in demand to perform in Swaziland and South Africa. Donations from St Anthony's helped them secure a recording session in Pretoria, resulting in the sale of CD's to generate more income for MYC.

Imvelo Jewellery, another income generating project belonging to MYC always benefits from visits from St Anthony's students and staff. We regularly match a month's takings in one order when we buy gifts to take home for friends and family.



Year 8 pupils with the support of staff in the textiles department made dresses for the young girls in Ngwane Park Home. St. Anthony's girls also included a letter about themselves with the dresses which was very much appreciated by the Swazi girls. We continue to contribute to the welfare of the girls by donating funds, clothing and toiletries.



Visiting Hope House and witnessing the amazing work of Sr. Elsa and her dedicated staff is always a very emotional and humbling experience. Cancer, TB and Aids patients receive care that is second to none. A generous donation is always left on your behalf with Sr. Elsa.
