Each Department's Marking Policy reflects the needs of the individual subject ,but is developed in line with the academy policy.

Principles of Marking

- The marking of pupils' work should be regarded as a regular means of communication with pupils and parents about their progress.
- This written or oral communication must be in a form that is clearly understood by the pupil.
- Pupils should have the opportunity to act on the comments made by teachers
- This feedback on progress should inform the next step in a pupil's learning.

Purposes of Marking

- To encourage and stimulate pupils by praising current achievement.
- To assist pupils by focusing on aspects of their work where further development/improvement is needed.
- To enable the teacher to make judgements about pupil attainment.
- To provide feedback on how well the pupils have understood the work and enable them to plan the next stage of their teaching and learning
- To promote functional skills across the curriculum

Guidelines for Marking

- Work should be marked regularly.
- Marking should be carried out in an appropriate colour, be clearly visible and easily understood.
- Written comments on a student's work should be predominantly constructive, acknowledging what has been achieved as well as identifying areas for improvement.
- A teacher should aim to give guidance on how an individual student can make that improvement.
- Teachers and students are involved in setting targets for their improvement.
- Pupils should have access to the marking criteria and understand the meaning of the marks/grades/levels they receive.
- Peer and self assessment should be encouraged where appropriate as part of the school's commitment to Assessment for Learning.
- Marking practices and procedures should be consistently applied within Departments and across the School.
- The quality and consistency of marking should be monitored within Departments and by Senior Managers.

This policy is reviewed annually by the governing body (autumn term meeting).
