4.The history of our school – summary information.

Understanding the ethos of our school requires an understanding of our history. The school was founded by the Sisters of Mercy who had a fundamental commitment to high quality education for girls. The Sisters founded the original one room school in the 1840's. In 1904 the school became known as St. Anthony's. The convent, and the school, were then situated in Green Street in the centre of Sunderland and very near to St. Mary's R.C. Church.

In 1939 the school moved to its current site. During the 1970's St. Anthony's Grammar School became a Direct Grant Comprehensive and later a Voluntary Aided Comprehensive School.

In 2012 the school became an Academy and in 2014 St. Anthony's became the lead school within Beacon Teaching Alliance. In 2018 trusteeship of the school passed to the Roman Catholic Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Education Trust was formed. In 2020 St. Anthony's joined with other schools in the area to form Bishop Chadwick Catholic Education Trust, as part of Diocesan reorganisation.

5. Catherine McAuley foundress of the Sisters of Mercy who founded our school.

Catherine McAuley founded the Sisters of Mercy in 1831. The religious order has always been associated with teaching. She was born in Dublin to James and Elinor McAuley. Her father died in 1783 when she was five and her mother died in 1798. Catherine and her brother James moved in 1803 to live with relatives, the Callaghans. She became the household manager and companion of the Callaghans who were an elderly, childless, wealthy Quaker couple. For twenty years Catherine, a Catholic, gave catechetical instruction to Catholic household servants and Catholic village children. Mrs. Callaghan died in 1819 and when Mr. Callaghan died in 1822, Catherine McAuley became the sole residuary legatee of their estate.

Catherine inherited a considerable fortune and chose to use it to build a house where she, and other compassionate women, could take in homeless women and children to provide care and education for them. On the feast of Our Lady of Mercy, 24th September 1827, the new institution for destitute women, orphans, and school for the poor were opened and Catherine McAuley, with two companions, undertook its management.

Catherine never intended to begin a community of religious women. Her initial intention was to assemble a lay corps of Catholic social workers. In the same year the archbishop desired Miss McAuley to choose some name by which the little community might be known, and she chose that of "Sisters of Mercy", as works of mercy were the distinctive features of the sisters. She was desirous that the members should combine the silence and prayer of the Carmelites with the active labour of a Sister of Charity.

Catherine and two other women entered the formation programme of the Presentation Sisters to formally prepare for life as women religious. At the end of their first year the sisters professed vows and returned to the House of Mercy. The Sisters of Mercy consider 12th December 1831 as their foundation day as a religious community.

A cholera epidemic hit Dublin in 1832, and Catherine agreed to staff a cholera hospital on Townsend Street. The religious "rule" of the Sisters of Mercy was formally confirmed by Pope Gregory XVI on 6th June 1841. Catherine lived only ten years as a Sister of Mercy, dying of tuberculosis on 11th November 1841 at the House of Mercy in Baggot Street, Dublin.

At the time of her death there were one hundred Sisters of Mercy in ten foundations. Shortly thereafter, small groups of Sisters left Ireland to establish new foundations in the United States, Newfoundland, Australia, New Zealand, and Argentina and the UK.

In 1843 Sisters of Mercy, from the convent in Cork, arrived in Sunderland to carry out works of mercy in the city. The statue of Our Lady of Mercy which they brought with them still resides in Oaklea, Convent of Mercy. At the behest of Canon Kearney, Parish Priest of St. Mary's, they founded a convent and school in Green Street. In 1904 that school became St. Anthony's. In 1939 the sisters moved the school to its current site. Some of the original glass from the Green Street Convent Chapel was incorporated into the design of the altar and chapel furniture in St. Anthony's Girls' Catholic Academy new chapel when the "new" school was opened 2017. Our school still holds, at its core, the history and ethos of Mercy.

Total worldwide vowed membership within the Sisters of Mercy is about 10,000. The Mercy International Centre at Baggot Street, in Dublin, is the international

"home" of the Sisters of Mercy worldwide. The sisters, as such a large world-wide organization, have representation at the U.N. In 1978, the cause for the beatification of Catherine McAuley was opened by Pope Paul VI. In 1990, upon recognition of her heroic virtues, Pope John Paul II declared her *Venerable*.

5. Catholic Life, Collective Worship and Curriculum RE – summary information from our school Diocesan Inspection Report (2018).

Overview.

St. Anthony's is currently outstanding in their overall effectiveness, securing the highest judgements in every category: Catholic Life, Collective Worship and Religious Education. Our Catholic ethos and mission to provide exemplary Catholic education underpins everything that we do; Gospel values are central to our work and we are inspired by Christ to serve others. A strong sense of community is evident in the school and leaders at all levels lead by example, supporting all on their faith journeys, helping to create communities which are inclusive and respectful, warm and welcoming. Collective worship is outstanding in the academy as we provide many and varied opportunities for prayer, reflection and worship. These include quality liturgical experiences, assemblies, Masses and retreats. Students are involved in a range of ministries and are enthusiastic participants, responding willingly, reverently and with confidence. Our Catholic ethos is further enhanced through our strong links with our former trustees (the Sisters of Mercy), local parishes and partnerships. The quality of Religious Education is outstanding, providing challenging and imaginative programmes to maximise learning opportunities. Staff strive for excellence and students enjoy their learning, motivated to achieve well and develop spiritually by putting their faith into action in their daily lives.

St Anthony's Diocesan Inspection Report: June 2018.

The mission of this Mercy school permeates all aspects of school life. The focus on concern for the poor and the education of women and girls is paramount. The foundations laid by the Sisters of Mercy are lived out in this inspiring community. Collective Worship is outstanding. The response of pupils, staff and governors is profound and deeply rooted in faith. A wide range of worshipping opportunities are prepared and delivered including liturgies, assemblies and Masses.

The Catholic Life of the school is outstanding. The strong sense of belonging, so passionately proclaimed by every member of this community, is overwhelming. It is in the quality of relationships that a deep sense of spirituality is evident. Tolerance and respect for all ensures that almost all pupils thrive and are confident in their spiritual, emotional and intellectual growth.

Religious Education is outstanding. The newly in post subject leader has led substantial improvements throughout the department with a significant impact on outcomes. Pupils enjoy Religious Education and make very good progress in a subject they enjoy.

We are a lead school in the Carmel Teacher Training Partnership for Initial Teacher Training and have trained well over 100 student teachers during the last three years. We are also partners with Teach First for the delivery of the Early Career Framework (for those in their first and second year of training) as part of a Trust - wide initiative.

St. Anthony's was awarded Teaching School status in September 2014. This involved the academy in leading Beacon Teaching School Alliance and providing:

- Initial Teacher Training
- Continuing Professional Development
- School to School Support
- Research and Development

In 2021 existing Teaching School arrangements were re-configured to form regional "hubs". St. Anthony's, and the Teaching Schools within Bishop Chadwick Catholic

Education Trust, are now working as of 01.09.2021 with the Tees Valley Teaching School Hub which is based at St. John Vianney School, Hartlepool. The academy is involved in the One Vison Project (working with another academy in the region) and a Transition Project working across two trusts.
