<p>Learning Intent for this module: This unit aims to develop student knowledge and understanding of child development. You will learn about five different areas of development – physical, cognitive, communication and language, emotional and social – and how these areas are linked</p>	<p>Learning Intent for this module: In this unit students will look at some of the key principles that are reflected in best practice in early years. Students will learn about inclusive practice as a way of valuing children and ensuring that they can benefit from the opportunities within the setting. Students will also explore how children are empowered to ensure that children learn to become independent and develop a strong self-image, as well as ways in which this is put into practice. A further principle of working with children is the key person approach, which early years settings use to meet children’s emotional and care needs. In this unit, students will learn why the key person approach is important to children’s learning and development.</p>
