

Entry Requirements...

- Entry Requirements for Sixth Form to study 3 A-Level/BTEC courses are a minimum of 5 GCSEs including 3 at Grade 5 and 2 at Grade 4 or better.
- Entry Requirements for Sixth Form to study 4 A-Level/BTEC courses are a minimum of 5 GCSEs at Grade 7 or better.
- Those students who have achieved between 5 GCSE Grades at 4 and the Standard Entry Requirement should talk to the Academy about individualised programmes of study based on a reduced list of options.

Effective Study

Independent Study - Learning Environment

- Find a quiet space to study
- Remove distractions (i.e. their phone!)
- Make sure they have all the equipment needed to study effectively:
- Paper (lined and plain)
- Pens (some different colours will be helpful)
- Highlighter (NOT for highlighting everything randomly!)
- Post-it notes
- Flash cards
- The school will provide these things for anyone who needs support with this (no excuses!). If anyone is struggling with equipment you might need, talk to your form tutor.



What do the experts say?

- Spaced practice v Cramming = doing small amounts of revision over a longer time has been shown to increase knowledge retention. This means that students can remember stuff for longer when they do it this way.
- The homework set in class by teachers will support the development of long-term memory. This is why it is vital it takes place!
- Cramming relies on your short-term memory. This has limited space.
- In short: you are likely to remember more if you study throughout the two years. You will not remember everything if you leave your study to the night before your GCSE exams.



What are the most effective techniques?

- Revision Cards
- Note taking (e.g. Cornell method)
- Graphic organisers (e.g. mind maps)
- Knowledge organisers
- Quizzing (e.g. online revision sites often have these)
- Complete practice exam questions (these are available on the exam board websites).

Assessment throughout our Curriculum

- Assessment is an on-going process which supports the curriculum and student development
- In order to be effective, it should be used to inform planning for future lessons and individual interventions
- It includes formal and informal (e.g. questioning and practice during lessons) assessment



Reporting progress through our Curriculum

- We have moved away from written reports
- In KS4 we move away from 'Surface, Deep and Transfer' to grades aligned with our GCSE / BTEC offer
- In the reports you will receive:
 - An Attitude to Learning
 - WAG = teacher estimation of the current level they are working at based on key tasks and other relevant evidence
 - PFG = teacher estimation of what they believe the pupil is capable of achieving if they maintain their current rate of progress and effort
