

What you give.


But I will come,

SAFEGUARDING UPDATE

Children can be exposed to different views and receive information from various sources. Some of these views may be considered radical or extreme.

Radicalisation is the process through which a person comes to support or be involved in extremist ideologies. It can result in a person becoming drawn into terrorism and is in itself a form of harm.

The DfE have produced advice on the Prevent Duty for schools and childcare providers in England. This gives more detailed guidance about the actions schools and childcare providers should take to prevent and respond to concerns about radicalisation.

It is important that children do not share their passwords with other people, apart from their parents. Please monitor your child's activity on social media closely, to ensure they are safe at all times.

Each app your child uses will have an age rating and it's useful to know what these are. Most have a minimum age of 13 years, but you should check the age rating of individual apps to make sure.

You know your child best, and you might decide that they need to be a little bit older before they can use certain apps.

As part of the governments agenda to reduce Parental Conflict, which Sunderland has adopted the term Relationships Matter, Together for Children have acquired the Oneplusone Digital Resource which consists of three online courses.

The aim of this resource is to help parents reflect on conflict in their relationship with current or ex-partners, and the impact of that conflict on their children. Parents can access the course via a QR code using their mobile phone or tablet.

COPING WITH SELF-HARM:

Self-harm is when someone hurts themselves on purpose as a way of trying to manage distressing or overwhelming feelings and experiences. Someone who is self-harming might be dealing with lots of intense thoughts and feelings, and hurting themselves may feel like the only way to cope. Or, they might feel numb and hurt themselves in order to feel something.

If your child is self-harming, or you're concerned they might be, it can be incredibly worrying and upsetting for you as their parent. The important thing to remember is that you and your child are not alone - lots of young people go through this and come out the other side with different ways of coping with their feelings.

Football is a core activity within our PE curriculum and is offered as an extra-curricular activity where students have the opportunity to represent the school.

















Tennis lessons during the summer term



During the summer term all PE classes will visit the tennis courts for a 6-lesson block based on a rotation between April-July.

The tennis courts are located on Thornholme Road, adjacent to Thornhill School. All classes travel to and from the tennis courts on foot escorted by their PE teacher, via Thornhill Terrace, Beechwood Terrace, and the zebra crossing on Thornholme Road.

PE staff carry the department mobile phone, there is a first aid kit at the courts and on arrival the gates to the courts are locked for the duration of the lesson.

If the lesson takes place during period 5, to make the most of the available lesson time, students are dismissed at 3pm from the tennis courts:

The following options are available:

- 1. Parents are permitted to pick students up from the courts. This must be at 3pm.
 - 2. Students are permitted to walk home or to their usual bus stop.
- 3. Students are permitted to return to school to meet friends/siblings, and they will be escorted by their PE teacher. They will arrive back at school between 3.05-3.10pm.

Year 11: Medicine taster day at Sunderland University

On Wednesday, March 6th, some of our Year 11 students interested in a career in medicine had the opportunity to visit Sunderland University to experience studying medicine at the university. It was a brilliant day, and students had the opportunity to attend a lecture on anatomy, have discussions with a GP about diagnosing health issues, and have the amazing experience of visiting the mock ward at Sunderland University with actor patients who the students had to communicate with, carry out simple tests upon, and attempt to diagnose! The day ended with a Q&A session with medical teaching staff, medical students, and admissions tutors.

One of the students who attended, Leana, said, 'I've always been interested in medicine but this has made me really eager to study it in the future and possibly have a career in it as well. I enjoyed everything about it. The atmosphere was really friendly and helpful and I also enjoyed experiencing the type of activities that some med students might do. Overall, the people were really friendly and supportive and I thoroughly enjoyed it'.









Year 12 Visit to Durham University

A group of Year 12 students had the opportunity to attend a university preparation event at Durham University. They enjoyed a tour of the campus and were able to look at one of the colleges to find out more about student life at Durham University. The students participated in a session on how to write an effective personal statement. They then had the opportunity to have a Q&A session with some current students, which they found really beneficial. Several of the Year 12 students are considering applying to Durham after their visit.

Work Experience deadline: Year 10 and Year 12

The deadline for all work experience placements to be secured for Year 10 and Year 12 students is **Monday 15th April**. Students are expected to self-source these placements in order to ensure they go to a relevant workplace linked to their future career aspirations. Placements must be inputted to Unifrog - there will be sessions after Easter for any students having difficulties in this area.

Any students who don't manage to secure their own placement will be placed somewhere chosen by the school, so please encourage and support your child to find their own placement over the Easter holidays if they haven't yet secured a placement.

I was also fortunate to be involved in the annual school musicals, with principal roles in Joseph, Oliver, Into the Woods, and Calamity Jane.







Following the support and encouragement I received from St Anthony's, I went on to study Voice in Performance at the London College of Music. During my time here, I was able to complete work experience at Abbey Road Studios with the English Session Orchestra and was trained by esteemed theatre practitioners. We devised a new piece of theatre inspired by the legacies of Bertolt Brecht and Kurt Weill, and my final production was an adaptation of Lorca's Blood Wedding.

Despite graduating amidst the challenging situation of the pandemic in April 2020, I remained undeterred in my pursuit of a career in the performing arts. Signing with an agent, I secured roles in lockdown-safe performances, refusing to let adverse circumstances stifle my passion.



Emerging from lockdown, I eagerly participated in esteemed theatre festivals, notably the Festival of New Theatre in Scotland (FoNTS), and more recently I was at the 2023 Edinburgh Fringe Festival starring as the role of Isla Kerr in Brief Candle. The production received a glowing reception, earning multiple 4-star reviews, and I was honoured with a nomination for Best Solo Performance at the OffFest Awards.

Additionally, I am proud to be a founding member of 'Songbirds', a vocal ensemble established in 2015 during our time at St. Anthony's. Committed to using our talent for the betterment of our community, we regularly entertain residents at Care Homes and organise biannual charity concerts, raising over £13.8k for local causes since 2016. It is so rewarding seeing the difference we make by giving up a small amount of our time, this makes it one of my favourite things to be a part of.

To support my passion in the performing arts, I currently work as a Fraud Preventions Manager. As much as performing arts is what I would love to do full time, this role ensures financial stability, a testament to the well-rounded education I received at St. Anthony's.
